

East Salem Harvest Opens In Earnest During Week

East Salem, July 6—This week the harvest season really started in the surrounding rural districts. The cutting of hay began and hay balers will start in a few days. The picking of cane berries for the canneries began, and the cherry harvest was finished, with the platoon from the labor office making its last trip Wednesday.

Butter Prices Decided Upon

Albany—Retail butter prices in Albany were established Wednesday at 80 cents a pound following a conference of the Portland exchange, attended by two representatives from the local territory, held at Portland Tuesday. This is a cent lower than that set for Portland and many other points.

J. M. Crocker, manager of the Albany creamery, who attended said Wednesday that at the meeting it was determined that to compensate producers for loss of the 15-cent government subsidy which has been in force for the last four years the conferring manufacturers agreed to advance the wholesale butter price 12 cents, making up the additional three cents themselves.

It is the opinion of the producers, Crocker said, that butter prices will recede to a point somewhere near 65 cents if and when the government ceases to offer a premium per pound butterfat price for factory milk, which is now being converted largely into powdered milk. The government is now paying \$1.03 cents per pound butterfat for factory milk, Crocker said.

Bob Lima Rescued From Burning Auto

Silverton—Bob Lima, now of Portland and formerly of the Monitor section, was painfully hurt when his car skidded on the Silverton-Mt. Angel road, turned over and slid several yards after turning on the top.

The S. A. Pitney family, who had been to St. Paul for the evening, were the first at the scene of the wreck, and rescued Lima unconscious from the badly damaged car and extinguished a fire in the motor. The injured man was given first aid treatment at the Silverton hospital, then was taken by the Elman ambulance to the Pine street home of his aunt, Mrs. Ruth Nelson, with whom his mother, Mrs. Christine Lima, also of Portland, was spending the evening.

Lima was found to have sustained many body abrasions and bruises, several broken ribs and head injuries. The crowded condition of the hospital prevented him remaining and he was cared for at the Nelson home, where he is convalescing satisfactorily.

Sewer Project Gets Under Way

Dallas—A small mountain of dirt is piling up at the north end of Church street as the P. S. Lord company began construction in earnest on the city's deep storm sewer this week.

The sewer will extend to Birch street. It starts on the north end at a depth of 17 feet and will slant upwards from there. Size of the concrete tile will taper from 30 inches on the north end to 21 inches at the southern tip.

Hardpan struck at 12 feet is already giving the contractor trouble. Excavation has been held at the depth while ways and means of going through it are figured out.

Title will be laid as the digger progresses, since under the contract with the city, not more than 300 feet of open trench is allowed at a time.

The purpose of the intercepting storm sewer is to relieve the load of all sewers in the city as they cross Church street. When fall and winter rains come the new sewer will relieve the sewer system of the load at Church street. The system east of Church is expected to have sufficient capacity to handle drainage water in that section of town.

Petitions were circulated and on May 13 and May 20 of this year these were presented before the Linn and Marion county courts, respectively, and approved. Future plans call for the purchase of a fire engine for rural runs.

Council Lets Street Contract Considers Bridge Replacement

Silverton—A decision of the aldermen at the week's meeting of the city council was to award V. F. McKenzie of Salem the contract for improving South Third street from Main to Koons, and one block on Main, for the consideration of 55c a square foot, and a definite charge an hour for equipment and materials used in the operation.

Property Exchange Delayed
Petitions prepared for signatures of residents of Westfield and Center streets for improvement of roadways are ready for the advocates of the move, according to City Manager Robert Borland.

The question of exchanging the Washington Irving school building for the athletic field was laid on the shelf, granting a request of Mayor George Christenson.

Bridge Seems Assured
That a bridge is to be built from the present Coolidge and McClaine park to the swimming pool and the proposed new parking area, appeared to be a literal fact, as the mayor mentioned that \$3300 was still in the park fund. After a lengthy discussion the decision was agreed upon for the city manager to use his own judgment as to the best material to be used for the bridge, with logs favored, and a suggestion was made that some of the log material could be from trees now growing in the city park.

Police Car Favored
The mayor expressed himself as in favor of the city buying a police car, and arranging the time of three regular police on a three-way shift period to relieve one man from being on the night shift only in his three-way turn. The question of raising the salaries of police according to provision of the adopted budget was left to the discretion of the city manager.

The council favored the request of volunteer fireman for solid stream fog nozzles and for handshakers for use in chimney fires. The mayor asked for increased water rates for outside users. Request for sewer pipe for "B" street was tabled.
