

Stayton Council Adopts Budget

Stayton — Adoption of the 1946-1947 city budget and tax levy, acceptance of several building permits and notification to property owners to clean up premises and vacant lots were among important items on the city council calendar.

The council adopted the budget prepared several weeks ago. The tax levy of \$5,272.62 was also approved.

Building permits were granted to G. A. Neymeyer for remodeling a garage and erection of a fruit house, \$700; Wilbur Porter, 505 3d to remodel a one-story building in rear of Porter-Lau Radio store, \$300; Schlies Bros. garage, 240 E. Water street remodel store building, \$1,000.

The council also ordered property owners to clean up weeds, grass, briars and other fire hazards from premises and vacant lots. The application of W. H. Stevely of Salem to operate a card room and soft drink establishment in the Lambrecht building was turned down.

A street light was ordered placed in front of the Fred Camp residence on First street. The city allowed the closing of E. Ida street during the bean festival for the carnival.

The group also favored erection of a city speed limit sign on W. Ida street.

Dallas Attempts To Hold Prices

Dallas—Local merchants are determined to hold the line against skyrocketing prices without OPA control, but as is true over the nation, certain commodities have taken inevitable jumps already.

G. Brandt at the Dallas Creamery stated that he was forced to raise the price of butter to 73c wholesale and 80c retail to compensate him for paying the producers an additional sum equal to the former government subsidy. He predicted that milk might reach 17c per quart and anticipated rises on ice cream.

Some grocers sold butter at the old price of 67c during the week before stocks taken on prior to the jump were exhausted. One chain store manager refused to accept butter at the higher price, stating that he had strict orders not to raise anything without official notice.

Meat also began to soar, as was true in most other localities.

A furniture dealer announced that he would stick to price ceilings and that manufacturers and wholesalers had announced to him that they were backing up such a policy.

One automobile dealer enjoyed the week without OPA control, saying, "You don't know what elimination of all those forms means to us." A groceryman said that he was afraid to up the price on evaporated milk in accordance with a price boost just prior to the OPA's expiration because of the anticipated public reaction.

No evidence of a buyer's strike is apparent here, but the public and businessmen alike are hoping that anti-inflation education of the OPA has had sufficient effect to keep the public from competing for scarce articles and unscrupulous merchants from voluntarily boosting prices.

Rural Fire District Directors Selected

Silverton—The five directors to be elected this week as a governing body of the Silverton rural fire district include Alvin King, W. J. King, H. B. Jorgenson, Conrad Johnson and Anton Dahl. Voting is to be at the Bethany school house.

The group of five will have authority to recommend a millage tax to cover fire service expense out of Silverton, and to contract for such service.

The fire protection district was recently approved at a hearing before the Marion county court.

The area includes districts within a five-mile radius of town. The local fire department is to answer all calls from this section. New and adequate equipment will be provided for this extra work when the project is contracted on a money basis.
