Harbor Report Time Extended

Washington, July 6 (P)—The Pearl Harbor investigating committee decided today to ask Senate and House for another extension of time, from July 10 to 16, for filing its blame-fixing report for Japan's 1941 attack.

The full 10-member Senate-House committee checked today on the progress of a subcommittee drafting the report. It found numerous matters remaining to be threshed out.

Chairman Barkley (D-Ky.) told reporters he hoped for an unanimous report. But some republican members reported they were arguing about what facts should be included. And Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) is writing his own version of a proposed report to be laid before the full committee.

Other members said Ferguson had largely ignored the subcommittee's deliberations.

With the Michigan senator going his own way, Rep. Keefe (R-Wis.), has been the only member of his party active in the subcommittee's work. Democratic members are Senator Lucal (Ill.), chairman, and Representatives Clark (NC), and Murphy (Pa.).

Chinese Reds State Demands

Harbin, July 5 (Delayed) (P)—Chinese communists are demanding that their forces in Manchuria be of equal strength to the government's, their commander-in-chief declared today.

The communist commander in Manchuria, Gen. Lin Piao, said in an interview this question had been coupled with a proposal under discussion in Nanjing that the communists withdraw from Harbin.

While the communists are willing to discuss the evacuation of this important north Manchurian railway city, Lin asserted they would not even talk about government demands that they give up other cities north of the Sungari river, such as Tsitsihar northeast of here.

Lin asserted that the United States would be welcomed in Manchuria "on an equal footing" with any other nation because the communists were vitally interested in seeing the rich northeast territory developed economically.

The first prerequisite for the restoration of trade and industry in Manchuria, Lin said, was an end to the civil war.

"The nation has not the strength, economically, politically and militarily to continue the struggle," he said.

He viewed as a "decisive factor" whether the United States would be willing to withhold military and financial aid from the one-party Kuomintang government and help only an all-party coalition.

The note was prepared in reply to a White House statement last Tuesday to the effect that the United States was prepared to assume technical and financial responsibility for the transportation of 100,000 European Jewish refugees to Palestine in accordance with recent recommendations of the British-American inquiry commission.

The Arab committee said it "would have lived to ignore this last statement and attach no importance to it—coming as it does at a time when President Truman is begging for Jewish votes in the forthcoming presidential election."

"We wish to remind the president, however," the note added, "that if he is really genuine in sympathizing with the Jews and their plight in Christian Europe, we advise him to open his White House doors to them or the doors of his American continent, which can absorb not only 100,000 but millions of them."

Boat House and Motors Burn

Fire early Saturday afternoon practically destroyed a floating storage house owned by the Salem Boat house at the foot of Chemeketa street, and with it ruined three boat motors and damaged three others. The boat house is operated by Willard Taylor.

Motors owned by Walter Lotlis and two other persons were destroyed. Others owned by Lawrence Anderson, Homer Smith and Gus Klempel were damaged.

How the fire started was not known. Some oil stored in the small building created a dense smoke that made the fire spectacular for a few minutes. The fire department laid one line of hose.

The fire charred one end of a larger building, but the damage was not serious.

The building was insured. Whether the motors were could not be immediately found out. The loss in motors was around \$1250.

Arabs Rap Truman, Suggest He Open U.S. to Europe's Jews

Jerusalem, July 8 (P)—Threats of a possible Arab civil disobedience program in protest against Jewish immigration to Palestine were coupled today with an Arab slap at President Truman and a suggestion that he open America to Jewish immigration "if he really is in sympathy" with them.

Dr. H. F. Khalidi of the Arab executive committee said that group was drafting a new note to Britain warning that unless the British government took immediate steps to halt the illegal entry of Jews into Palestine there would be "a wave of non-cooperation by Arabs, following possibly by civil disobedience."

"After that," the spokesman said, "the next step may be mass demonstrations by Arabs, and this executive will refuse to accept responsibility for them."

Khalidi's statement came as the executive committee disclosed it already had drafted a letter to President Truman accusing him of "flagrant, empty and irresponsible statements" in connection with the problem of Jewish immigration to Palestine.
