## Silverton Poll Shuns Meters

Silverton—An unofficial campaign sponsored by the Appeal-Tribune, local weekly publication, shows only two votes for parking meters, and hundreds against.

Opposing for various reasons were farmers, workers and business men and women. All favored strict enforcement of a two-hour limit in the business district, a 15-minute limit for parking in front of the post office, and other time limits in different sections of town. New parking limit signs have been placed with hopes that this plan will be effective for the present.

A welcome relief for downtown parking are two parking lots close in for all-day or several hours' parking, to be opened in the near future, the surfacing having been completed.

Mayor George Christensen was asked if the public opinion in the unofficial vote would affect the attitude of the council on meter installation. He said he had not had time to consult other members and he could not give a definite reply as to the future action on meter installing.

## SILVERTON PRIEST WILL IS PROBATED

Portland, July 16—A will written in a Japanese prisoner of war camp in Manila and smuggled out before the death of the Rev. Richard E. Carberry, 42, aboard a prison ship a few months later, has been probated in circuit court here.

The former Silverton priest in the document written Oct. 21, 1944, bequeathed \$8,000 to the archbishop of Portland and a sister and a brother. The Rev. Father Carberry died of wounds on a Japanese ship Jan. 24, 1945 after twice previously having been aboard prison ships that were torpedoed. He was captured on Bataan while a chaplain for Philippine scouts of General MacArthur's forces.

## Two Brothers Held to Jury

Silverton—Two brothers, Paul and Wallace Langley, accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, have been ordered held for the grand jury. With Judge Alf. O. Nelson presiding, the \$1000 bond under which Paul Langley was placed was furnished. His brother was released on his own recognizance because of his being responsible for the support of his five children. A thirteen-year-old girl was involved. Douglas Harris represented the defendants. Miller Hayden was present for the trial. Ray Rhoten was special counsel for the private prosecutor.

Jerry Cronin, alias Lloyd B. Wickman, pleading guilty to larceny of tools, was sentenced to 30 days and \$25 and costs in Judge Alf. O. Nelson's justice court Saturday. On recommendation of the man who lost the tools, the jail sentence was suspended on payment of the fine, costs and restoring the tools.

With his sons Mr. Van Den Bosch had been in the sawmill business continuously for 26 years, starting at Falls City and later moving to Pedee creek. The present mill is rated at a capacity of 20,000 feet daily.
