

Bids on Dallas Bonds Opened

Dallas—Bids on a city bond issue of \$42,000 were opened at the meeting of the Dallas city council Monday evening and the joint bid of Fordyce and company and Charles N. Tripp of Portland was accepted. The bid was \$100.46 for each \$100 by the concerns who offered 1 1/4 percent interest.

Meanwhile, the storm sewer project, for which the bonds are to be issued and now under construction by the P. S. Lord company, was encountering natural difficulties. A layer of bedrock at a depth of about 12 feet, five feet above the contemplated depth, was struck at the north end of the project where work started. The company has been blasting through some of the rock but a revision of plans has been decided upon by the council and contractors in view of the circumstances.

The sewer will be laid three feet higher than planned with an additional line branching west from it at the south end, paralleling the sewer on Maple and running through to Levens and Hayter streets to assure the carrying off of storm water in that part of the town.

Kenneth C. Laudahl appeared before the city council to obtain permission to blast within the city limits. He is clearing stumps in an addition north of the city park. Some complaint had been received that his blasting caused debris to fall in the city park. The council discussed the matter and referred it to the street committee with power to act.

It was reported at the meeting that no one had been hired to fill the vacancy on the police force left with the resignation of Herman Janzen last week. Janzen accepted other employment in town.

No one but members of the city council and the budget committee appeared at the public hearing on city budget Monday evening and the budget was adopted in a resolution by the council.

The budget calls for a total levy of \$27,037.79 for 1946-47, about \$3,000 over that for the previous year, which was \$23,984.97.

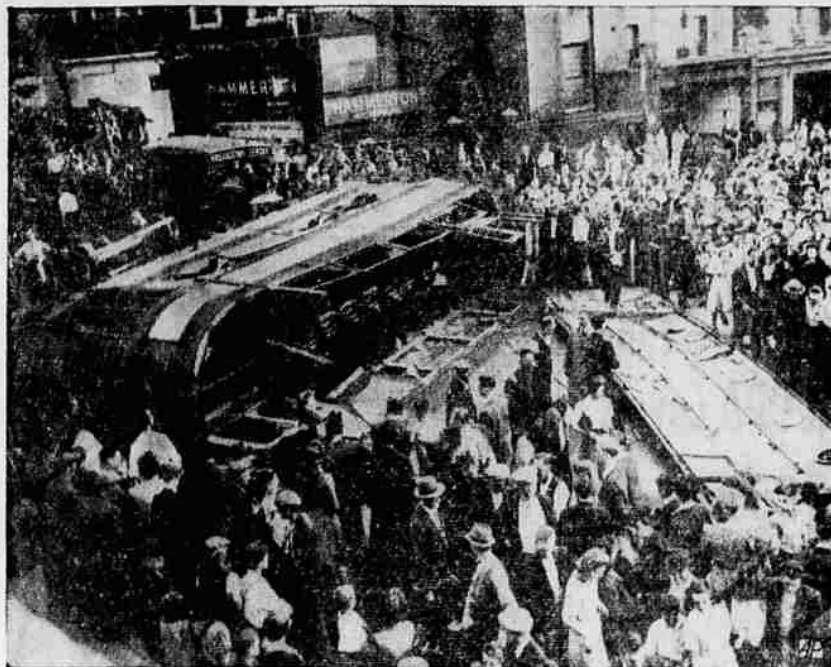

Shortages are holding him back
