Rainfall on the day of July 8 for a 24-hour period nearly tied that of Dallas for what was considered a wet month of June. June in Dallas hit 1.63 inches, wettest since 1937, while in Valseltz on the rainy July day, precipitation totaled 1.61 inches.

The logging town measured 5.83 inches in June, two inches over the moist month of June, 1943. Rain fell on 15 days of the month.
