Program For Champoege Set

Fred Thiele of Wilsonville, and Rev. Frank Leipzig of Eugene.

At 11 a.m. Sunday His Excellency Most Rev. Archbishop Edward D. Howard will celebrate a solemn pontifical high mass out-of-doors at the park. A special program has been arranged by the Knights of Columbus and will be presented at 2 p.m. The program will be as follows: America the Beautiful, string ensemble; invocation by Rev. J. J. Walsh, state chaplain of the Knights of Columbus; vocal selection by Ruth Rodawowski, accompanied by Wayne Meusey, address, Senator Coe McKenna of Portland, representing Governor Earl Snell; address on Dr. John McLaughlin, Father of Oregon by Dan Hay of Salem; musical selection by the string ensemble; Early Catholic Pioneers of the Oregon Country by the Rev. Francis Leipzig of Eugene, and Our National Anthem by the entire audience accompanied by the orchestra. A special invitation is being extended to both Catholics and non-Catholics of Oregon to attend either or both the morning and afternoon exercises.

Arrangements are also underway to have five radio programs broadcast during this week over stations KOIN and KGW. The programs will deal with the history of the Catholic church in Oregon for the last 100 years. The time of the broadcasts has not yet been set, but will be announced in the radio section of the papers.

Don't Urbanize Rural Children, Advised
