Monmouth Will Save on Water

Monmouth—Users of Monmouth city water will be notified this week by handbills of the necessity of cutting down on consumption of water for lawn and garden sprinkling.

Mrs. Elsie Brisbane, city recorder, said that the present crisis is due partially to the hot weather and subsequent increase in use of water for irrigation and partially to the fact that approximately 50 new subscribers have been added during the past year to mains both in and out of the city limits.

The conservation plan follows one in use in Portland requesting occupants of even numbered houses to irrigate only on even numbered days and those in odd numbered houses to water on odd days during the shortage.

Albany Reports Ice Shortages

Albany—Hot weather and other circumstances combined to inflict an ice famine here and throughout the Albany territory Tuesday, but moderation of the recent heat wave is expected to give manufacturers a chance to catch up.

Harry Seavy, manager of the Albany Ice & Storage Co., principal source of ice in this territory, explained the situation Wednesday by saying that hot weather stimulated demand for ice and soon exhausted both daily production and storage supplies. Local population has greatly increased; many people are using ice now because they cannot get refrigerators, and so far as Albany is concerned, the situation was aggravated by the fact that many other communities, including Jefferson, Lebanon, Sweet Home and to some extent Corvallis, depend upon the Albany plant for ice.

The daily capacity of the Albany Ice & Storage Co. here at present is 11 tons of ice a day. The new plant now under construction in South Albany will have a daily capacity of 40 tons, giving this territory a supply source of more than 50 tons a day, but meanwhile the 11-ton plant must suffice.

Five tons was imported Tuesday night, but this supply was soon exhausted.
