

Dallas Will Shine Under New Street Light System

Dallas—In the autumn, when night comes early, Dallas will reveal its night life beneath the brilliance of some of the most modern street lighting in Oregon.

Under the administration of Mayor Hollis S. Smith, assisted by a cooperative council and plenty of public support, Dallas has authorized what Mayor Smith defines as "the latest achievement in street lighting."

From one of the poorest lighted towns in the Willamette valley, Dallas will become one of the very best anywhere by October 1.

Modernized street lighting covers 12 downtown blocks and will be automatically controlled by an electric eye that opens and shuts off street lights according to a predetermined degree of visibility. On dark days they will come on early, perhaps as early as 3 p. m., and when the mornings are dark with fog they will remain on until a suitable degree of visibility is attained.

Lanes in Alleys
Another feature of the program is removal of light lines from the streets into the alleys. New street lamp posts will be of metal and the delay in receiving these posts has already retarded the lighting program.

Dallas acquires her streamlined lighting on a lease basis and the end of 14 years the system reverts to city ownership.

In addition to better illumination, the city administration is sponsoring a sewage disposal and drainage project estimated to cost \$150,000. Dallas electorate has already approved this project and construction of some type of trickling filter sewage disposal system will begin when materials are readily available and plans are a bit more perfected. Sewage disposal will be designed to care for the needs of a town of 10,000 persons (about twice the present population of Dallas) and will end a long standing complaint about stream pollution of Rickreall creek.

Work on the extensive drainage project to relieve basement inundation in West Dallas is already underway with a 36-inch drainage line running north and south and emptying into the Rickreall near the high school. Within 30 days, Mayor Smith believes, the drainage job will be completed and the stage will then be set for initiating the extensive, \$70,000 paving project.

Mayor Hollis S. Smith came to town as a child in 1903. He attended and graduated from Dallas schools and was a student at the University of Oregon. For many years he worked for the county. In 1927 he entered the automotive business, became a councilman in 1940 and was elected mayor for a two year term in 1944.

The three daughters were with their mother during the last weeks of her illness. Also surviving are 20 grandchildren, 19 great grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Her husband died December 5, 1911 in Silverton.
