

IN AND OUT OF UNIFORM Navy Supply Corps Taking Men

For qualified young men there is now an opportunity for a career in the navy supply corps, according to a recent announcement by the Office of Naval Officer Procurement in Seattle. Men accepted for duty with the supply corps will receive a commission of an ensign in the regular navy and will be sent to one of the navy's supply corps schools for an intensive training course. To qualify the men must be between the ages of 21 and 26, having been a citizen of the United States for at least 10 years, be in good health and be a graduate of an accredited college or university.

Mary Lee Taylor's
Meat and Potato Salad
Broadcast:
August 3, 1946

2 tablespoons finely cut onion
3 tablespoons meat drippings
2 tablespoons flour
1 tablespoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
few grains pepper
1/2 cup vinegar
1 cup Pet Milk
2 1/2 cups diced, cooked potatoes
1 1/2 cups diced lunch meat
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
3 tablespoons drained pickle relish
Cook onion slowly 5 min. in drippings. Blend in mixture of flour, sugar, mustard, salt and pepper. Stir in mixture of vinegar and water. Stir and boil slowly 2 min. Remove from heat, stir into milk. Mix in remaining ingredients. Garnish with hard-cooked egg slices and strips of pimiento, if desired. Serves 4.
