

Lebanon Woman Hears of Jap Cruelty to Brother

Lebanon—A tragedy hidden during Japanese occupation in the Pacific, and unknown until a letter from an eye witness recounted the horror, was unfolded recently when Mrs. Charley Duncan, 679 West Sherman street, Lebanon, received word from her brother, Frank Shevlin of Joseph, Ore., that their brother, Edward, for 20 years a well known gold mine owner and operator in the Philippines had met death at the hands of the Japs shortly after Philippine surrender.

New Mennonite School Pushed

Grand Island—Western Mennonite school, Polk county's newest sectarian institution, is now under construction in the northeast part of the county, adjacent to Highway 221 between Dayton and Salem. Workmen have been setting forms for the industrial arts building, first campus structure in a program outlining a \$300,000 development.

Lately Mennonites have acquired a 200-acre site in this section for their industrial development and the industrial arts building, 36 by 90 feet, will serve as a temporary high school and may be completed in time for the fall term. The structure will accommodate approximately eighty pupils. Plans for future campus structures call for an administration building, 40 by 120 feet, built of pumice stone, gymnasium, library, assembly hall and dormitories for both boys and girls.

Purpose of the new, co-educational school is to offer practical, secular training in agriculture and provide more Bible training with courses than the ordinary high school. The institution, explains F. J. Gingrich, general superintendent and Mennonite bishop at Canby, will be open to youth of other Christian denominations, as well as Mennonites.
