Flax Parade List Growing

Mt. Angel—W. D. Harris, chairman of the Grand Parade for the eighth annual Oregon Flax Festival August 9, 10 and 11, announces that the latest addition to the parade scheduled for Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock is a float by the Birdseye Snider Canning company of Woodburn, and a drum and bugle corps and marching unit from the Eagles auxiliary of Portland.

A grand sweepstake cup will be awarded and a smaller cup given to each of the five divisions which include floral, industrial, marching units, bands, and miscellaneous. Ribbons will be given for second and third places in each division.

Governor Earl Snell will be here for the parade and be the principal speaker at the program that follows immediately after the parade at the reviewing stand north of the city hall.

The committee in charge of the parade which is shaping up into a many-sided event is comprised of Harris as chairman, Lee Withers, Sylvester Schmitt, Frank Hettwer, and Herman Schwab. All local firms have signed up for an entry of one kind or another.

A variety of sports events will entertain the crowds from 4 to 6 p.m., notable among them a BB gun contest open to boys up to 12 years. The first prize will be a 1000-shot Daisy air rifle, second prize a 500-shot Daisy, and third 10 bags of BB shot. All the prizes are donated by Fleck Hardware of Mt. Angel. Saturday night there will be an outdoor show in front of the Schwab warehouse followed by a street dance.

Slate Reunion Of Gribble Clan

Aurora — Descendants of John and Elizabeth Gribble, early Oregon pioneers, will mark the 100th anniversary of their arrival in Oregon with a centennial reunion celebration at the Canby fairgrounds August 18. Attending the gathering will be third, fourth, fifth and sixth generations.

For the past six years, Ralph Gribble, fourth generation descendant, has been engaged in collecting and compiling the history of the family. He has traced the family tree to the latter part of the 18th century, when several Gribble families resided in North Carolina. To one of them, in Mackinburg county, North Carolina, John Gribble was born on June 6, 1799. In 1818 he joined the Baptist church, and shortly afterward became a Baptist minister.

In 1821 he was married to Elizabeth Ensley and they moved to Warrensburg, Mo. To this union eleven children were born, of whom five boys and three girls lived to maturity.

Records have been found of circuit riding preaching done by John Gribble during his early years in this territory. These and other records and mementoes owned by various members of the family will be displayed at the reunion.

Building Progresses On Pallet Factory

Lebanon — Construction will be completed within two months of the plant to manufacture pallets, located five miles southeast of Lebanon. More than 50 workers will be needed, it is estimated. One of the manufacturing units of the Pallet Manufacturing corporation, this plant was begun in June.

Eighteen men are now working on the construction, A. W. Lung, foreman, said.

Pallets are wooden prefabricated platforms now in demand to expedite shipping and storage.

The new plant buildings, 180 by 40 feet and 104 by 68 feet, are constructed of wood and steel, with brick drying kilns.

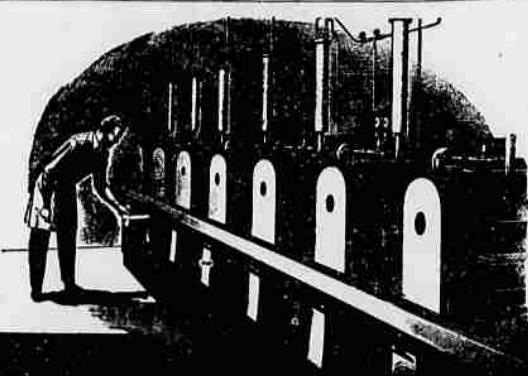
