

'Spot' Zoning Silverton Topic

Silverton—"Spot" zoning was frowned upon by certain members of the city council Monday night, particularly when property owners of good homes had not been "in the know" until too late to save their neighborhood from the change from residential district to industrial or commercial zoning.

Alderman Alfred Adams talked right out loud in his protest against the planning commission recommendations to the council for spot or even general zoning changes when the published descriptions were in not understandable lines and figures until the damage was done to the home places by permitting industrial plants to be placed among homes of years standing.

Two members of the city planning commission from the side lines gave their defense opinions and were asked by the councilmen to have petitions signed by property owners in affected neighborhoods presented to the commission before recommendations were made. One member felt that "carrying petitions was out of line with the intended work of the commission."

Adams explained that "after all, we as councilmen are mere representatives of the taxpayers and homeowners and they should at least be notified."

When things were fairly warm, one councilman made a motion concerning general and spot zoning action privileges that received no "second."

Allen Presides

Reber Allen, alderman for many years and ex-mayor of Silverton, presided in the absence of Mayor George Christensen.

The council favored a proposition of George Manolis and Herman Naegli of Center street who requested the improvement of the street, asked by all residents who will contribute their shares of money for the work, excepting the Pattergers who asked to be permitted to donate several yards of land to make the corner from Cherry, Phelps and Center street safer for the turning from the hospital. Westfield street may also be improved in a request by Naegli if all residents sign a petition.
