

Employment Future Bright

Lebanon—The past month shows heavier employment figures in the eastern Linn county area than ever before in its history, and the future looks even more bright, according to July reports of the local U.S. employment service. There are shortages existing principally in the logging industry, yet ratio of openings to total employment is of small proportion, the report states.

The future looks very bright with respect to increased employment for some time to come. The peak, judging from the present outlook, will occur about the first of the year. All predictions point to an upward trend for the future, for with new plants not yet operating and increasing force in food processing, no other conclusion is possible.

A high percentage of employed veterans in comparison with the total labor force is evidence that the returning men are receiving all the attention possible. The past month shows 786 of them now employed which equals 22 percent of this area's total employment force.

There are 510 women employed at present as against 250 two months ago and a rise to 648 is expected by the end of August.
