Lip Lure



Particularly during the warm weather, the best way to make up your mouth is with a lip brush. You'll get a clean, unblurred outline that will have less chance of smearing on a sultry day.

If you've never tried a lip brush you'll undoubtedly be surprised at the ease with which you can use it after a few times. Here are some hints on how to use it to achieve the best possible results.

1. Start with clean lips from which every trace of previous make-up has been removed. Dust with powder for a clean, dry surface.

2. Carefully stroke the brush back and forth over the lipstick and gather a generous coating of color on the brush.

3. With the lip brush, draw the outline from the center outward on the upper lip and from the corners inward on the lower lip.

4. Load the brush with color again and fill in. Or block in the color with lipstick. Press your lips together over a tissue.

Always keep in mind that a woman is more appealing with soft full lips than she is with a thin hard line. Also to be avoided are the extreme cupid's bow, the pointed upper lip and the over-done lower lip. The lip brush will help build up thin corners to a curve.
