Death Results From Injuries

Lebanon — Mrs. Robert C. Injured, but not seriously, were Mr. Stitch, Ted Reid, driver of the car, and his brother, Jess Reid, both of Sweet Home. Ted Reid was thrown through the windshield, and although unconscious for a time after the accident, was released from the hospital. The other two injured were released shortly after treatment.

Both the tractor and auto were headed south with the Stitches on the way home after working the night shift at the Spencer cannery. The tractor was demolished, and the sedan badly damaged.

Funeral services were held at the Howe-Huston chapel Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. and shipment will be made to Fairfield, Neb., for burial. Only survivors, besides her widower, are her parents, two brothers and grandparents, all living in Nebraska.

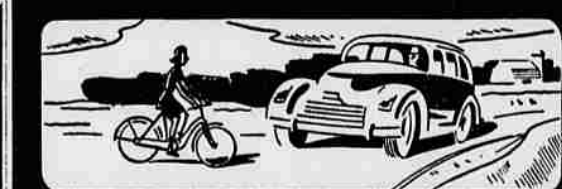
