Silverton—Mayor George Christenson called a special meeting of the city council Friday night to present an ordinance for first and second readings whereby the city accepts the proposed annual \$1400 franchise, formerly \$750, of the Portland General Electric.

Mayor Christenson explained that this change was uniform in this section. The ordinance will be up for final reading at the next regular meeting of the council.

Another matter pending for many months, was culminated with the city accepting the Washington Irving school building in exchange for the equipment and area of McGinnis Field, a deal made on an even trade with the Silverton school district No. 4.

The mayor said that a community center would be evolved from the deal with different organizations of town to have space for club rooms and an overflow from the city hall when more room would be necessary for the new equipment for rural use at the city hall. He also said the library would be housed in the building.

Hiebert Apartment Building Is Razed

Dallas—The Hiebert apartment building located on Church street near Washington is now being razed by the owner. Part of the lumber to be salvaged will be used in construction of a residence in North Dallas.

The building was condemned by the city council last September, but due to the fact that occupants were unable to find other living quarters, the matter was not pressed at that time.

Tax Collections High Linn County

Albany—Tax collections during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946, set a new all-time high record in Linn county, it was noted by J. H. Wilson, Toledo, in his report on the audit which he has completed in all offices of county government.

The auditor found that Linn county taxpayers paid to the sheriff during the year \$1,035,881.14 in taxes and that the sheriff furthermore collected \$697.50 in auto license sticker fees, issuing 2790 stickers; \$790 in fines and \$2,130 in mileage fees.

The county treasurer was found to have received \$1,772,651.97 of which \$736,770 was from sources other than taxation. Treasurer's disbursements totaled \$1,820,323.92. A balance of \$69,210.73 had been carried over, and a balance of \$215,229.70 was on hand in the treasury at the end of the fiscal year.

The auditor found that the county budget was not exceeded, and in fact that \$27,245.89 of budgeted funds were unexpended.
