

## Plan for Sewage Treatment Plant

Woodburn—At the meeting of the city council Tuesday night Mayor Austin was authorized to sign an application for advanced planning for a sewage treatment plant to meet a request from the state that the city look ahead and plan for better sewage disposal. When the application is approved by the government the city engineer will be authorized to make a complete survey of the existing sewer system and determine where additional lines are needed.

A report of traffic conditions in the city streets was given by Day Marshal Clyde Asbury. After a study of the report the council decided that additional ordinances are needed for the safety and convenience of the public.

The engineer's plat of the Stewart addition to the city, located on Brown street at the east end of Stark was approved.

The city recorder was instructed to call for bids for the improvement of First street from Cleveland to Oak and Settlemier avenue, for Harrison to South Front street.

## Graduates Hear Morse

Monmouth—In an address entitled "The World We Live In," Sen. Wayne L. Morse stressed to the Oregon College of Education graduating class the need for qualified teachers to lead the citizens of the United States down the path of world citizenship. He stated that he believes that the next 10 years will determine the course of the future of America and stressed the obligation of the teaching profession to take the fullest part in this task.

Morse emphasized the importance of mastering human relations, stating that idealistic international problems are based on cold reality.

Noting that Americans must realize this country has no monopoly on science and that it is the personification of ignorance to believe other nations within a few years will not have the atomic bomb, the speaker stated that only by making use of the powers of reason and fulfilling our obligations of world citizenship can this country be saved from another war.

Music for the commencement program was furnished by Virginia Ward Elliott of Salem, soprano soloist, and C. Robert Laxson of the OCE music department.

Twenty-seven of the 33 students upon whom were conferred bachelor of science degrees in elementary education were present to receive their degrees in the hooding service conducted by President C. A. Howard. Dr. Ivan C. Milhous presented the graduates.

The invocation was given by the Rev. C. O. Heath of Independence, and Willard L. Marks, president of the state board of higher education, greeted the graduates and introduced Gov. Earl Snell, who was in the audience. Other distinguished visitors for the occasion included former Rep. and Mrs. Walter Pierce, Mrs. Dean Walker and Carlton Savage of the department of state in Washington, D. C.
