

Albany Schools Open Sept. 16

Albany — Renovation work and other preparations are being rushed to completion throughout the Albany school system in preparation for the opening of schools for the 1946-47 year on September 16, concluding the summer vacation period.

City School Supt. R. E. McCormack states that teacher staffs of the elementary and junior high school grades have been completed, but that two vacancies remain on the senior high school staff, which will include two additional instructors this year.

However, he expects these positions to be filled within the next few days.

The largest senior high school enrollment in the history of Albany is expected. Teachers recently signing contracts hitherto unannounced are Margaret Hammerbacher, girls' physical education and health instructor in junior high school, and Patricia Silver, art and social studies in junior high. Both are University of Oregon graduates.
