Short Houses For Teachers

Lebanon — An acute shortage of teachers is faced here if living quarters cannot be located for instructors before schools reopen on Monday, Sept. 16, Supt. James W. King warned this week.

Declaring this to be the gravest situation of its kind ever to develop here, the superintendent appealed to residents to open their homes temporarily to teachers, until permanent housing is available. He pointed out that some of the teachers are veterans and eligible for veterans' surplus units when completed, and also that the housing shortage should be eased when quarters now being privately constructed are ready for occupancy.

Meanwhile, school plants are being put in readiness for the new year. At the high school, walls are to be repainted and fluorescent light fixtures are replacing old drop cord units. Santiam school has been repainted and the playground surfaced with asphalt. Repainting has also been done at Queen Anne school.

A substantially increased enrollment is in prospect, according to the superintendent.
