

Complete West Water Mains

Lebanon—Completion of new water mains in the west end of the city this week will mark conclusion of one phase of the Mountain States Power company's large 1946 program to improve Lebanon's water system.

While construction of the new filtering plant, comprising the remaining part of the program, is progressing shortages of labor and material are slowing the project and it is indefinite when it will be in operation.

Now running through the west part of town are 12-inch mains from the water plant to Fifth and Sherman streets, and 10-inch pipe from there to Fifth and Tangent to Main and Morton.

The improvement also provides for six-inch mains from Fifth and Tangent to Seventh and Tangent, and a four-inch line from Tangent to Harrison.

Warns Against Cashing Checks

Dallas—District Attorney R. S. Kreson today issued a warning to all Polk county merchants to "beware of cashing checks."

He stated that bad checks aggregating over \$1000, over 20 in number, had been turned in to his office recently. They include good checks which were properly issued and endorsed and later lost or stolen but owners who had payment stopped, some obvious forgeries and others of the "5 and 10" variety, small checks merely written NSF or no account.

Kreson attributes the present wave to transient farm labor in the county, here for the hop and prune harvest.

One Dallas druggist accepted a check for \$75 last week on which payment had been stopped. Another druggist cashed a check for the same party which was issued and endorsed to another person by a reliable Salem producer's cooperative. The check had been stolen and payment stopped the merchant learned later.

"Most merchants are unable to furnish an adequate and accurate description of the persons involved," Kreson said. "Often it is difficult to determine what charge to file against them and it may take two or three weeks to get out a complaint, not to mention locating the party involved."
