In the class for sows under 18 months of age, Adkins' entry placed first, Harold Whitaker's second and Gene Muller's third. In the group over 18 months of age, Bob Burch took first and Harold Whitaker second.

In their respective classes John Koch's Duroc sow placed first, as did his Duroc gilt; Gene Muller's Berkshire and Hampshire gilts took first and Whitaker's Chester White barrow also topped all entries.

Tax Delinquency Small in Linn

Albany—Linn county will enjoy its smallest tax delinquency in history when the final report on delinquencies is made, it was indicated by the report on tax collections by Sheriff Mike Southard for the last half of the 1945-46 fiscal year.

The report reveals that of the total 1945-46 tax levy of \$1,058,232.87, payments were \$875,535.30 at the end of the fiscal year, June 30. Rebate payments totaled \$14,936.36, but \$678.84 in interest was collected, leaving a net of \$661,46 tax warrant.

This leaves an unpaid balance of \$382,697.57, but it was pointed out by Mrs. Lela Nelson, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections, that since then and before August 15, when the 1945-46 levy became delinquent, more than \$300,000 had been paid in and a delinquency of less than \$58,000 will remain on the sheriff's books.

The report shows that delinquent taxes for previous years totaling \$37,557.39 were collected, including interest, giving the county total tax income of \$698,836.17 on June 30.

Additional collections insure the county total payments at least equalling the total 1945-46 tax warrant.

No Candidates 5 City Offices

Albany—Residents of Albany faced another shortage Thursday with August 31 the last date that candidates can file for city offices. Late Thursday only five candidates for the 10 vacancies that will occur in city officialdom at the end of this year had indicated intention of seeking election, leaving five vacancies, including that of mayor, as yet unsought.

Mayor G. C. Knodell, who would have been a potential candidate for re-election, is not qualified to seek re-election being a candidate for state senator from Linn county.

Only candidates so far are city recorder, C. R. Ashton and city treasurer, Stanley Peterson, seeking re-election; R. L. Chandler, chief of police, who aspires to election as city marshal, vacated by resignation of Perry Stellmacher; George Parker, aspiring to re-election as councilman from the third ward and Rex Butler, seeking also to represent the third ward.

The first and second wards were still without candidates for the council with F. L. Thompson and Harold Fisher, first ward councilmen, and G. A. Flood and V. A. Hurley, second ward councilmen not having filed.

The shortage of municipal candidates loomed when it became known that candidates must file 65 days before the date of election instead of 40 days, as heretofore, due to a recent change in election laws.

In canning judging there was a tie for top honors between Donna Wiederkehr and Jeannette Gilmour with a three-way tie for second place between Janice Bishop, Wayne Johnston and Sally Klein. Also there was a three way tie for third place between Bertha Jeskey, Donna Lee Klein and Frances Fox.
