A STELLAR program is that of the Community Concert series for the season 1946-1947. Outstanding artists have been the choice of the membership holders and the season promises to be one of the most exciting and full of high-ranking musical talent ever to be presented in Salem.

Season tickets will be in the mail on the way to subscribers about October 1, announced Mrs. Max Rogers of the association.

Opening the series with a late October concert will be Rudolf Firkušny, brilliant Czech pianist, who returned to the United States early in the summer after a triumphant visit to his native land, his first visit to Bohemia since 1938. His work with the New York Philharmonic symphony has been adjudged by critics as "masterly." He appears at the Salem High school auditorium on Friday, October 25.

The fame of Todd Duncan, bright new star in the concert horizon, spread after his initial appearance with the original cast of "Porgy and Bess," George Gershwin's famous folk-opera. Duncan now makes his first transcontinental tour. Presenting a complete program of art works, Mr. Duncan's offerings, of course, include selections from the famous Gershwin work. Second on the Community Concert series list, he appears in Salem Thursday, January 23.

"Consistently brilliant" is the critics' summary of Erica Morini, Italian violinist. She "should not be described as a great woman violinist, because her playing has become great regardless of her sex." So says the New Yorker. She is magnetic and plays with authority and mastery. She appears in Salem Thursday, February 27.

Highlight offering of the season's community concert series is the presentation of the full Minneapolis symphony orchestra, under the direction of its great conductor, Dmitri Metropolis, who of late has been a frequent guest conductor of the Boston symphony. The event will be one of the greatest in the musical history of Salem, with the concert scheduled for Thursday, April 10.

Last and climactic on the list of concert series offerings is Helen Traubel, Metropolitan soprano, and a Salem favorite, who because of her charm and unqualifiedly great singing, was most sought after for her appearance by her Salem concert hearers. She is completely endowed with the qualities essential to great singing, and no doubt her concert will be hailed by Salem music lovers. Her concert closes the series Wednesday, May 21.
