Truck of Hay Burns on Road

Residents along the highway rushed as Hamilton went by to try to tell him of his plight, but he was unaware of the trouble until he reached the Rickwall junction. The fire was caused from an overhead exhaust on the truck.

Brooks Needs Harvest Hands

Brooks—Eager to get their crops out of the ground and into storage houses before the autumn rains, onion growers of this area are seeking additional workers. The work consists of pulling, topping and placing in trays ready for the final drying.

Beets are also beginning to roll into the food processing plants in greater quantities and this means more work in the fields. While machines are used in most instances in the process of pulling and topping now, from three to four men are required for each machine to keep it functioning properly. There are a number of smaller fields in the areas surrounding Brooks with larger fields across the river in the Grand Island district.

Filbert harvest is also under way, and English walnuts will be ready in from 10 days to two weeks. The nut crop is expected to be one of the largest in the valley with ungrafted walnuts already beginning to drop in many fields.

Considerable Mexican labor has been used in the Labish and Mission Bottom areas, and their departure takes almost 600 laborers out of the fields.

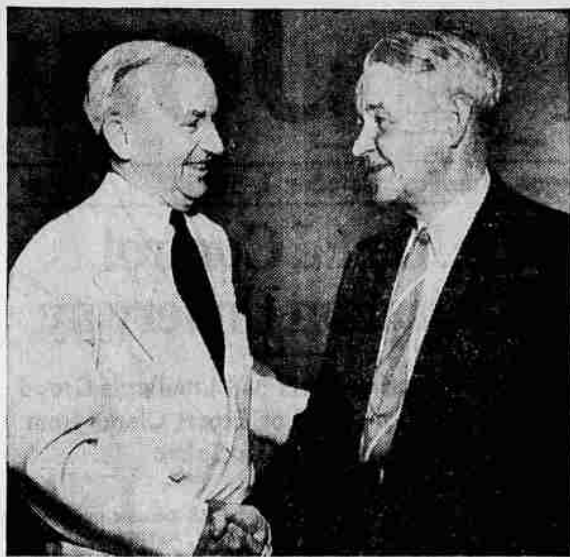
Burt Kelly has bought a lot from J. J. Denson on Third street and is building the first of a double wing house. The first unit will be 20 by 30 feet.
