Appointed to serve on the electing board were Mrs. Verne Axelsson, chairman; Mrs. Eunice Burk, judge; Mrs. O. C. Brown, Mrs. Doris Newberry and Mrs. Russell Smith, clerks. Elected for the counting board were Mrs. Bessie Rust, Mrs. Emily Van Santen, Mrs. Mary Sloper, Louis McClendon and Sylvia Myers.

O. C. Brown requested that a group of boys affiliated with the Gray-Y and YMCA, be granted use of the old city hall as a club room during the winter months. Permission for use of the hall for this purpose was granted by the council, providing the property was not sold to another organization interested in its purchase.

World War Veteran Heads Albany Drive

Albany Asks Airport Funds

Albany — The first step was taken Monday on the application to the United States government for an appropriation of funds in conjunction with local modernizing of the Albany airport.

J. V. Fengerger, an AAA assistant engineer and C. C. Lambert, an airport engineer of the Oregon district of airports, were in Albany to assist in making a request to the authorities in Washington, D.C., setting forth the needs of expanding and improving in general the Albany airport.

This request, if granted, will be followed by an official application whereby the government will pay 56.02 percent of the expense of improving and for 25 percent of the value of the land. The request and application is required to be made this month, the engineers, who met with Mayor G. C. Knodell, and Ralph Banton of the committee, said.

An election is to be held in the near future giving the legal voters the right to vote on the entire proposal, which includes the purchase of 75 additional acres of land.
