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National Forest Lumber

Cut Breaks All Records
Washington, Oct. 23.—Lumber demands for veterans housing stepped up front cutting in national forests to more than 1,000,000 board feet during the three months ending September 30.

It was the first time in history, officials told a reporter, that the lumber cut in any quarterly period on national forest reserves passed the 1,000,000 mark.

The production report brought an estimate that the total cut for the present fiscal year, ending next June 30, will be around 4,000,000 board feet, compared to 2,720,000 board feet logged during the last fiscal year.

Future production may reach 6,000,000 board feet yearly, without harm being done to national forests, it was said.

The actual amount of timber cut during the July-August-September period was 1,103,484,000 board feet, having a value of \$4,585,864, forest service officials said.

Total sales for timber cutting during the three-month period amounted to 1,100,108,000 board feet of timber, with a value of \$4,655,111.

National forests in western states accounted for virtually all the production increase, with the cut in eastern forests showing little change.

The production by board feet and the value in states which recorded the largest increases for the quarter were given by Oregon, 256,104,000.

Public Works Stock Limit

Washington, Oct. 23.—Administration officials maintained today that general public works expenditures in the present fiscal year would be held fairly close to the \$900,000,000 limit set by President Truman in August.

Reconversion and budget officials indicated that the total of such expenditures would be around \$950,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000.

It was estimated unofficially that the revised general public works program would comprise authorizations for completion of around \$1,150,000,000 of construction during the fiscal year.

Budget officials indicated, however, that actual cash expenditures for these purposes in the fiscal year ending next June 30 should be around \$200,000,000 less than this.

The general public works construction program covers the agriculture, commerce, state, justice and interior departments, veterans administration, flood control by army engineers, rural electrification administration and national advisory council for aeronautics.

It does not include \$400,000,000 for military construction by the army and navy, and around \$34,000,000 for the reconstruction finance corp., maritime commission and coast guard.

Total expenditures for all government construction—military and non-military—during fiscal 1947 thus are estimated at about \$1,350,000,000 to \$1,400,000,000.

OPA decontrol of all foods except sugar and rice barely flicked the surface of trading sentiment, although some sugar shares responded to the market with moderate gains.

Virtually ignored too, were a stream of favorable earnings reports, dividend declarations, postponement of a threatened Western Union strike, and partial settlement of the shipping tie-up.

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Wheat Tends To Work Lower

Chicago, Oct. 23.—Removal of price controls from flour failed to stimulate buying in wheat today and the bread cereal tended to work lower.

Cash markets were strong, featured by sales of No. 2 yellow soybeans at \$3.40 a bushel for shipment during October, November and December. This was up 12 cents from yesterday's closing bid.

Wheat closed unchanged to 3/4 higher, January \$2.04 3/4, corn was 3/4 lower to 1/4 higher, January \$1.40 1/2, and oats were 3/4 lower to 1 cent higher, November 63 1/2-3/4.
