### Need For More Women in Home Nursing Stressed

Stressing the need for more women to be trained in home nursing, the committee in charge of this work for Marion county chapter, American Red Cross, says: "Nurses are still 'rationed' it might be said, and this condition will continue for a time. But there is no cause for alarm if you are prepared. When sickness strikes, someone in every home should know what to do—whether it's really necessary to call the doctor, and if it is, how to save his time and effort."

The Red Cross has a goal to see that three million additional persons are instructed in home nursing throughout the nation.

**What They Learn**  
Men and women, boys and girls, may enroll in classes. What do they learn in home nursing? The committee points out some of the following fundamentals:

In home nursing you learn to recognize signs of illness, to carry out the doctor's instructions, to keep a patient comfortable throughout 24 hours, to care for mothers and new babies, to protect the health of other members of the family while caring for a patient with a communicable disease, to keep yourself and your family well. Many things learned in the course are useful in looking after a happy and healthy family whether or not an emergency comes for a short or prolonged illness, the committee states, but in knowing these pointers some one in the home is just that much better prepared when an emergency comes.

**Seven Classes Going**  
So far the Red Cross chapter here has seven classes in progress, some among girls in the high schools, others for women in various communities. A class for women of Salem is slated to begin next Monday, and others will be formed as the need arises. Mrs. Ralph E. Moody is chairman of the home nursing committee of the Red Cross and Mrs. Louise Arneson is the chapter's director of nursing services assisting with the training in the classes and organizing the groups.

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### OPA Explains Penalty for Failure to Register Here

What happens if a landlord neglected to register within the 45-day period allowed under OPA rent regulations was outlined today by Jackson T. Moore, OPA rent executive, in a dispatch from Portland. Moore cited two examples:

"If it comes to the attention of the rent office that a residential living accommodation is being rented, but has not first been registered, then it becomes the responsibility of the rent director to determine the rent on the basis of the prevailing rent for like accommodations on July 1, 1945, the maximum rent date. In such cases, the rent so determined becomes the maximum legal rent on the effective date of the rent regulation in the area, namely, October 1, 1946, or the date of first renting, whichever is later.

"If a housing accommodation was first rented after July 1, 1945, but before October 1, 1946, and the first rental is higher than the prevailing rent for like accommodations on July 1, 1945, then the rent director will order the rent reduced to the 'freeze date' level. The reduction would be effective on October 1, 1946 if the landlord registered after November 14, the end of the 45-day period. However, if the landlord registered within the registration period (October 1-November 15, 1946) the reduction would not be retroactive but would become
