

Mrs. Henagin Misses Children And Hobbies in Prison Life

Life as an inmate at the Oregon State prison was still too new to Mrs. Luella Henagin Thursday, for her even to have learned the routine of the institution to which she was committed for life for the second degree murder of her husband, Robert L. Henagin, West Linn school superintendent.

A woman, who during her life had utilized her every spare minute when not working, either following some hobby or planning things with her children, prison officials reported that on her arrival Mrs. Henagin wanted to know if there was something she could do to help at the institution.

Still without any tasks Thursday morning the former West Linn resident, who shares a room at the prison with another woman inmate, had gone to a room used by women there for sewing, ironing and mending and was seated by a radiator holding an unopened Bible and another book.

Events that have followed that tragic day in October when her husband was shot have left Mrs. Henagin a bit dazed, but she misses her daughter and son, to whom she apparently was a pal as well as a mother, and talked about the two, who will now make their home in Eugene with relatives.

Speaking of her children she commented that she had little spare time.

"I have given all of my time to the children," she said. "I taught them to play the piano, though I have had little music and it came hard for me, but not to my children. I spent 45 minutes every day with my son at the piano and taught the children to play such pieces as 'Shortnin' Bread' and always saw that they had the best music teachers." She went on to tell of the advancement her daughter has made in music and of her now taking violin lessons and of the 9-year-old son's musical accomplishments.

While she was helping her children with music Mrs. Henagin also found time to teach her daughter the practical arts of cooking and sewing. Musing on this she said:

"It was about five years ago that she started to cook. No longer than that, because I let her help me can fruit before that."

And later when talking she told of the assistance her daughter gave her in her household duties.

She said she had always kept her husband on the right road, helping him in the school field until he had one of the best positions in the state, adding that she had not been jealous of him.

Asked about hobbies Mrs. Henagin said:

"I have many of them. I have 500 varieties of plants at home, some of them that I have had 22 years, sew and do all kinds of fancy work except knitting." She said roses were not among her favorites but told of planting about 40 varieties at the end of a dead end street. Collecting rocks, too, is a hobby of Mrs. Henagin and she had a rockery made from rocks collected from all over the United States.

She told of putting her husband through school and helping his sister during one year. She claims to have read most of

3 True Bills By Grand Jury

The Marion county grand jury reporting Thursday returned three true and three not true bills and also filed their findings on a railroad-truck accident of September 25 in which Richard Harold Albin, Richard Allen Emmons and Norman Dean Scholfield lost their lives at the Madison street crossing of the Southern Pacific.

Recommendations by the jury as to the fatal accident to the three Salem youths included one to the city that it pass an ordinance reducing the speed of trains in the city and that the city or public service commission request the railroad company to install warning signs at such crossings as that at Madison street. No censure as to negligence was imposed either on the railroad company or the occupants of the truck.

True bills returned included indictments against Willis King and Joseph Waltman for alleged liquor theft from the St. Paul liquor store, bail fixed at \$1500 each; Sam E. Grey, forgery, bail fixed at \$1000, and William P. Doss, charged with aiding a com-

mitted person to escape from the state hospital, bail fixed at \$750.

Not true bills released Maxell Shannon from a charge of negligent homicide in connection with the death of Samuel Parker in a pedestrian-car accident; Robert Olson from a charge of assault with a deadly weapon and Melvin J. Birkes from a charge of negligent homicide in connection with the death of Albert C. Moore in an accident between a car and a truck.
