

School Consolidation Benefits Are Outlined by Nelson in Talk

Independence—Consolidation of the Independence and Monmouth and three rural school districts which is up for a vote at a special election to be held Monday night, January 20, will provide for a better school system without any additional cost, M. M. Nelson, chairman of the independence school board, told the members of the Lions club at their meeting.

Nelson explained that the plan to use the Independence building to house the high school classes and the Monmouth building as a junior high school would relieve the congestion now experienced in the grade schools of both cities.

The consolidation, he said, would enable the district to offer better courses, employ a school superintendent and to function more efficiently with fewer teachers.

Nelson also explained that the proposed merger would enable the cooperating districts to avoid the higher tax levies that would be imposed on the separate second and third class districts under the recently enacted French bill otherwise known as the rural school district bill. Merger of the five districts into one would make this a first class district with greater assessed valuation than the Dallas district.

Nelson said that it had been suggested that the high and junior high school buildings, in event the merger is approved, be named in honor of the Butler families of the two communities.

Should the consolidation fail to carry at this election the issue will be placed before the voters again at a later date, he said.

Dr. Donald Searing, chairman of the program committee announced that Mark Weatherford, prominent Albany attorney, will address the club at its next meeting in support of the proposed Peoples Utility district.

Linn Farmers Do Very Well

Albany—Linn county farmers generally fared very well during 1946, in the opinion of County Agricultural Agent O. E. Mikesell. Farm marketings are estimated to have exceeded \$16,000,000 for all agricultural products. This is an all-time high for the county.

The brightest spot in the county's agriculture was the small seed enterprise with an estimated income well in excess of \$4,250,000.

Poultry enterprises throughout the county showed a sharp reduction during 1946. This was particularly true of turkeys. The 1946 production is estimated as being 185,000 head as compared to 275,000 in 1946. This sharp reduction was due to the seriousness of the feed situation at brooding time.

The county's vegetable acreage reached 3,340 acres in 1946. This was an increase of about 500 acres over the previous high year, 1943.
