Justice Court Keeping Busy

Silverton—A busy day in the justice court of Judge Alf O. Nelson showed a reckless driving charge against Robert Pfeifer, complainant. Engram asked for 24 hours for consideration, failing to furnish the required bail was sent to the county jail.
