

Belcrest Memorial Park Scene Of Easter Sunrise Services

Regular communicants and others who will make their annual pilgrimage to the house of worship, are expected to fill Salem churches to capacity Sunday in observance of Easter.

Services at 1st Methodist

Two identical Easter services will be held in the First Methodist Church Sunday forenoon. The first service will begin at 9:00 o'clock, the second at 11:00 o'clock. The pastor, Dr. Joseph M. Adams, has chosen for his sermon the theme, "Will He Find Faith?" The chorus choir, under the director, Victor B. Palamason, will sing, "This Glad Easter Day" (Dickinson). Josephine Albert Spaulding will sing, "The Cross" (Harriet Ware) and "Edith Fairman" (Dickinson). The Rev. Louis White, pastor of the Knight Memorial church, will deliver the sermon. Special music will feature the observance.

Dr. Joseph M. Adams, pastor of the First Methodist church and president of the Salem Ministerial association, will preside during the program which will include scripture reading by Rev. B. A. Krueger of Central Lutheran church; selections by the Youth Center choir and a prayer by Rev. G. A. Rouser of Bethel Baptist church. "Rainbows That Remain" is the subject of Rev. White's address.

A few of the larger churches, in anticipation of overflow audiences, are arranging identical Sunday morning church services to accommodate the communicants. Baptism of infants and the reception of new members will be included in many of the church programs. Easter breakfasts, following the sunrise service will attract many people to the houses of worship as well as to private homes.

Special music, in keeping with the season of the year, will feature many services.

Dr. Moon Speaks To Christians

Dr. E. R. Moon will speak both morning and evening at the Easter services at the Court Street Christian Church. His morning message will be on the subject, "If a Man Die Shall He Live?" The series of special Easter meetings will be brought to a close Sunday evening when Dr. Moon will speak on the theme, "Man, Beast or Cabbage?"

St. Paul Choir to Present Eucharist

"The Holy Eucharist" by Tertius Noble, will be sung by the Senior Choir at both 7:00 A. M. and 11:00 A. M. service of Saint Paul's Episcopal church. The services will include "Christ Our Passover" by Schilling and the offertory anthem "Christ Triumphant" by Yon. The Junior Choir will sing at the Children's Eucharist at 9:30 A. M. Communicants may receive Communion at all three services.

Baptisms at 1st Christian

Two identical services, one at 9:00 and one at 10:50, will be held at the First Christian Church Easter Sunday morning. The church school will be abbreviated and will be placed between the two services. The choir, under the direction of John Schmidt, will sing the anthem "Now Is Christ Risen," by Shawker, and Fred Bates will sing "For God So Loved the World." Rev. Strain is to preach on the theme, "More Than Conquerors."

For the 7:30 hour, Mr. Strain has selected for his subject, "What Easter Celebrates." The anthem of the evening will be "God So Loved the World," by Stainer, and Betty Pugh Hagen will sing "Sheep and Lambs," by Homer. A piano and organ duet, "Adoration," by Borowski Stoughton will be a feature of the service, with Louis Schmidt at the organ and Harold Ranton at the piano. A baptismal service will climax the activities of the day.

For the offertory Kenard Adams will play a violin solo, "Cavatina." There will be a beautiful baptism service at this time.

In the morning Dr. Durden will speak on "The Glory of That First Easter." The Senior choir will sing "Calvary" by Rodney and "The Risen Lord" by Greene. The Junior Choir will sing "The Garden of Gethsemane."

TRINITY CHURCH IN BOSTON

There are several angles to the question why a building is famous, but to substantiate the caption above only a few need be recorded.

Any building set apart for religious services is of interest to the community. It reaches a higher level of interest if it is a distinguished example of ecclesiastical architecture. If its location dominates a street, an intersection, or a square, it becomes a landmark. If its communicants, or any one of them, are outstanding in the social and civic life of the community, or its rector or minister is of national importance, then the church edifice becomes famous. Trinity Church, fronting on Copley Square in Boston, meets all of these requirements and more. Copley Square is bounded by famous buildings and architectural masterpieces, yet Trinity holds its place unquestionably.

The view presented in the pencil drawing is from St. James Avenue and shows the majestic bulk and mass of the tower. Across the square may be seen the classic Public Library of Boston.

Trinity was consecrated in 1877, and at that time Phillips Brooks was its rector. He served as pastor from 1869 to 1891, when he was made bishop of Massachusetts. There is a Phillips Brooks memorial on the Huntington Avenue side of Trinity erected by popular subscription of his friends. The architect of Trinity Church, H. H. Richardson, defined the architectural style as French Romanesque, the central tower a derivative of the towered churches of Auvergne.
