All Highways Now Opened

All Oregon highways were open today, with mountain roads so slippery that chains were advised, the state highway commission said today.

Temperatures took a nose-dive as the first sub-zero temperature of the season was reported. It was 3 degrees below zero at Austin, in Grant county on the Central Oregon highway.

There still were several sections of one-way traffic on western Oregon roads. They were caused by slides in last week's floods and heavy rains.

Disaster Chief To Visit Salem

Richard Gordon, area director, disaster relief, American Red Cross, is to be in Salem Wednesday to consult with local disaster workers. A meeting of the disaster committee of Marion county chapter has been set for 4 p.m. Wednesday in the local Red Cross headquarters by I. A. DeFrance, chairman.

A recent communication from Clyde Baird, regional director of chapter services for the Red Cross, highly commends the booklet put out by the local Red Cross disaster group to inform the public what is to be done in case of disasters. In his letter, Mr. Baird states the booklet is "complete and an excellent outline," and he requests additional copies, planning to use the Marion county plan as a sample for chapters of comparable size and economic status of this county. DeFrance and his committee compiled information for the booklet and worked out the local plan.

C. Parmenter, Pioneer Dies

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Clough-Barrick chapel for Charles Parmenter, 88, one of the most widely known of the older residents of Salem, whose death occurred Friday.

Mr. Parmenter lived at 809 North Commercial street, the house in which he was born September 13, 1859. His parents were Charles M. and Hannah Pratt Parmenter, the latter a sister of the wife of the pioneer judge, R. P. Boise. His father was a factor in the early industrial life of Salem, having been engaged for some years in a furniture manufacturing business in partnership with Captain F. J. Babcock, who had been an officer in the Union army in the Civil war, and who was for a time Marion county clerk.

Mr. Parmenter was married in 1886 to Miss Susie Dickey of Salem. He was by occupation a carpenter, and for over 50 years had been a member of Carpenters union, local No. 1065. He was one of the construction crew that built the old state house and was employed on construction of the pillars for that building. Also he helped in the construction of many other of the outstanding buildings of the community.

Some years ago Mr. Parmenter was given publicity in the Robert L. Ripley "Believe It or Not" syndicated feature in connection with a famous oak tree that he planted on his home premises when a boy and himself cut down 65 years later.

He is survived by Mrs. Parmenter and by a nephew, Willis R. Cornell of Portland. The funeral service was held by Rev. Lloyd T. Anderson. Pallbearers were L. H. McMahon, C. H. McMahon, D. B. Cooley, W. D. Evans, H. D. Buckner and J. L. Simpson. Interment was in IOOF cemetery.

The new grand jury convened and received instructions from Circuit Judge E. M. Page Monday morning with Clarence M. Byrd named as foreman.

Cook Say Farmers' Co-operative vs. Oyster Growers' Service association, on trial before Judge George R. Duncan. Plaintiff seeking to require defendant to disclose amount of fresh oysters obtained from 1946 oyster crop, what portion sold and location of unsold portion and to account to plaintiff on its contract entered into in May, 1944, defendants to cultivate and harvest oysters on Cook Bay land and deliver to plaintiff allegedly on a basis of \$2 per gallon. Plaintiff also seeks to recover \$3169.50. Controversy alleged to be over extra costs claimed by defendant in cultivating and harvesting the oysters.

Dora vs. Melvin Porter, decree of separation from bed and board to plaintiff for an unlimited time, custody of four children to plaintiff and \$25 a month for support of each and immediate possession of household furnishings.

Hazel R. Brekke issued sheriff's certificate of redemption to fraction of acre of real property.

Marion Carl, marine ace, who is slated to address the officers of the local reserve unit and members of the civilian committee at a dinner meeting at the Marion hotel that evening and later will attend the unit's meeting at Building 7-514 at the Salem airport.

Two radio interviews have been slated for this week, both five minutes in length, and three window displays have been arranged in local business firms' windows. Tuesday evening at 6:45 o'clock Tech. Sgt. Wayne Curry, veteran of the last war and member of the local reserve unit will be heard in an interview over station KOCO. Friday evening, Sgt. George Wilkinson, who just completed two months of active duty in the local reserve office, will be interviewed at 8:30 o'clock over station KSLM.

The committee was organized and alerted to go on duty for any emergency, but this section came through with few calls, he said. The army engineers, who moved in from Portland especially to help out during the flood, co-operated in doing all the work in all sections around here in advance of the approach of the flood waters. Five families were given assistance in lodging and maintenance when stranded by the flood waters, it was reported.

Abendroth Discusses Guard
Problems and other matters pertaining to the re-organization of the National Guard were discussed by Col. William H. Abendroth, former adjutant general of Idaho and now on a tour of duty with the war department general staff, when he met with Oregon National Guard officers the past week-end. Among the items mentioned by the colonel at the meeting, which was held at the Portland army air base, was the close co-ordination and co-operation of all components of the army of the United States. During the meeting Brig. Gen. Thomas E. Riley, adjutant general for Oregon, stated that the Oregon National Guard will attend summer encampment early in the summer of 1948 at Camp Clatsop.

Protests Reach Council On Sewer Rental Charges

First protests against sewer rental charges reached the city council Monday night, coming from Oregon Pulp & Paper company and from users in the 800 block on North Liberty in the neighborhood of the Larmer warehouses.

The paper company complained that it is being charged on a basis of a large amount of water used that is not returned to the sewers. The North Liberty users said they had no sewer connections and used septic tanks. Under the service rental ordinance the council may make readjustments after the facts are fully presented.

Another petition for annexation of an outlying area came in, involving property in the southeast part of the city. The petitioners were Ronald E. Jones, Lawrence Anderson and Rich L. Reimann. They asked that pending the annexation the city extend the district city water service via the city main that runs through the area. City Manager J. L. Franzen said he saw no objection and it was approved. The area covers about 200 acres and includes the new H. C. Walling warehouse.

From the Oregon Pulp & Paper company came a proposal to lease ground the city owns at the north end of Minto island for log storage. It was referred to the manager.

Zoning Too Rigid

Aldermen were convinced that the city zoning ordinance is too rigid in some respects, and on motion of Alderman O'Hara the city attorney was directed to draw an ordinance making some amendments. This followed a petition from A. W. Johnson to be permitted to add an apartment to a dwelling at 744 North Capitol street, a residential zone, which he cannot do under the present ordinance.

On a recommendation by O'Hara as alderman from the district the council disapproved a billboard at 1890 Fairgrounds road.

City Manager Franzen asked the council whether it would prefer from him a report covering the calendar or the fiscal year, and the latter was approved.

Progress is being made, Franzen reported, when inquiries were made by O'Hara and Gille, toward installation of mechanical traffic signals at Fairgrounds and North Capitol, and wigwag warning signals at various railroad crossings. Franzen said he had been informed by the state highway department that the engineers are working on the traffic signal matter, and O'Hara said the secretary of the commission had told him it would be on the agenda of the commission at the February meeting.

On the wigwag signal matter Franzen said City Engineer J. H. Davis had completed a survey of all grade crossings, which are numerous, and that negotiations are under way with the Southern Pacific company.

Ward Readjustments

City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz was directed to bring in an ordinance bill incorporating newly annexed districts into adjacent city wards until a more permanent organization of Salem's three new precincts and ward boundaries can be effected.

Ordinance bills were passed assessing the cost of improvements to the following streets and alleys: Alley in block 1, North Salem; Frederick street from 20th to Breys; Church from Pine to Hickory; alley in block 12, George H. Jones addition; Pine from Laurel to Myrtle; 15th from Market to Norway.

Ordinance bills introduced were: Establishing set-back lines on South Commercial from Mission to Hoyt; establishing zone classifications for areas annexed to the city; granting Oregon Electric franchise for a spur track across D street to serve Terminal E & Cold Storage company; changing zone from Class I residential to Class III-X in 2500 block on Center for Doctors' clinic building; regulating fumigants and fumigators; bills by O'Hara setting up method of nominating and electing city officers under present city charter, to replace method following state law under old city charter, and requiring initiative and referendum bills to be filed not less than 70 days before election.

Conviction of Smith Upheld by Court

The state supreme court today upheld a Linn county case in which Ralph Smith was convicted and fined \$100 on a charge of preventing Mike Rose, a logger, from carrying on his work.

Smith was accused of using threats to prevent Rose from working. Court attaches said Smith's defense was that Rose was trying to log on Smith's property.

The only question for the supreme court was to decide whether the indictment charged a crime.

The opinion, by Justice Arthur D. Hay, upheld Circuit Judge Victor Oliver of Albany.
