Salem Women Hear Appeal

The women of Salem were urged today in a special appeal by Mrs. William R. Newmyer, March of Dimes chairman of women's activities, to give their wholehearted support to the 1948 annual fund raising drive of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis which takes place January 15-30.

In her message Mrs. Newmyer pointed to the growing incidence of polio in recent years as another vital reason for increased support of the March of Dimes, which provides medical care and treatment of polio patients and underwrites the national foundation's programs of research, education and epidemic aid.

"Crippled children, victims of infantile paralysis, are counting upon us to assure the success of the 1948 March of Dimes," said Mrs. Newmyer. "More than ever, it is important that success crown the annual campaign. The increased number of polio cases in recent years makes it more necessary than ever that Americans rally to this battle." She pointed out that the last five years have seen a record total of polio cases for any previous similar period.
