

John Logan AAUW Speaker On Saturday

John D. Logan, Portland attorney whose war experience reads like a spy novel, will address the January luncheon meeting of the American Association of University Women which will be held at the Marion hotel Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock. He will speak on "Western European Relations With the United States." The meeting will be open to guests of members with reservations to be made Thursday, or Friday morning by calling Mrs. O. A. Mr. Logan's father was the prominent Portland attorney, John F. Logan. When John D. was growing up he and his father spent most of the summers in Europe where the boy learned to speak French, German, Spanish and Italian. His law degree was taken at Harvard and the University of Berlin. He left his position as legal counsel for the state engineer in Salem to enlist as a private in the army in 1942. The Oregon man was commissioned as an officer in the intelligence division and became commander of a unit which decoded the German radio and at times entered the German lines. His assignments also included service in Martinique and Africa. Mr. Logan was decorated by several of the allied governments and has some unusual citations, including one from the Belgium government which is seldom awarded to foreigners. He is now a member of the staff of the district attorney's office of Multnomah county.
