Loan Association Tops Million Mark

Dallas—Passing of the million dollar mark in assets for the first time was reported at the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Polk County Federal Savings and Loan association by Laird V. Woods, vice-president and manager.

The report revealed a gain of \$128,441.85 in assets during 1947, making the total \$1,043,202.46. Savings deposited with the institution during the year increased \$138,961.07 and total loans increased by \$132,217.75 to a total of \$558,415.21. Loans to veterans under the GI bill amounted to \$89,222. The association holds \$489,500 in government bonds, most of which was purchased during the war.

All government money initially used in financing the association has been retired for several years and deposits are now all local money.

The group will have supervision and control of all parks and recreation facilities owned by the city and will also have control of the expenditure, under supervision of the council of all funds produced by tax or other means for promotion of parks and other recreation facilities.

The ordinance calling for the appointment of the recreation and park board was adopted by the council January 6 and was signed by Mayor Mattson last week after Frank W. Settlemyer, donor of the Jesse H. Settlemyer Memorial park, had given written authorization for transfer of control of the park from the Settlemyer park association to the new city board.

Dallas Given Power Relief

Dallas—A new 225-kilowatt sub-station in North Dallas, now nearing completion, will furnish some relief for the power situation in this vicinity, according to E. J. Page, manager, Mountain States Power Company.

Crews have been working on the new installation during the past week. It will be the third sub-station in the city. Page expressed satisfaction with the cooperation of the public during the heavy Christmas season when the power overload reached its peak. Expected shutdowns did not occur, although during the recent flood it was necessary to curtail some industrial operations when slides disrupted main transmission lines in the Willamette Valley.

"In general, conditions have been in our favor," Page declared in speaking of the crucial time of the year.

High Water Causes Damage Near Gates

Gates—The high water here, caused by a creek becoming clogged and overflowing its banks and running down the highway into town, has receded. The post office was completely surrounded by two feet of water, also several dwellings and a garage. Basements were flooded and the oil floor furnace in one home was put out of commission, leaving the family without heat.

Albany School Needs Outlined

Albany—Albany school district No. 5 needs two new grade school buildings and needs them right now, Dr. C. L. Huffaker, school planning consultant with the University of Oregon's school of education, told a capacity audience of more than 100 interested residents of both district No. 5 and adjoining districts at the Albany high school library.

Dr. Huffaker pointed out that while the number of first to sixth grade pupils in Albany district No. 5 increased but 100 from 1939 to 1943, first grade enrollment grew to 270 during the succeeding four-year period. This means, he said, that from 10 to 12 new elementary grade school rooms are needed to house pupils already here, not to speak of probable acquisitions through immigration. Approximately a third of the growth is of local origin and two-thirds is immigration, he estimated.

In Albany today there are 1378 children under school age, said Dr. Huffaker, and the present enrollment in the first to sixth grades is 944, with prospects that there will be an average of 200 per grade here in 1953.

Dr. Huffaker also disclosed that the Albany senior high school is becoming overcrowded, and that present facilities will be adequate by 1951 to accommodate only residential students leaving tuition students to be otherwise provided for.

Dr. Huffaker stunned his audience with the statement that present costs of school buildings range from \$20,000 to \$22,000 a room and he remarked that Albany has at present only 16 really adequate grade school rooms, while facing a need for 45 or more.
