

Woodburn Site Purchased By Portland Storage Firm

Woodburn—Announcement was made this week by the Chamber of Commerce that the Terminal Ice and Cold Storage company of Portland has purchased a site in Woodburn. It is understood that plans of the company for utilization of the tract will be announced soon by the company officials.

Dime Campaign Nearing Close

Woodburn—A "Mile of Dimes" event, sponsored by Woodburn Boy Scouts, is announced for Saturday, by Chairman William Merriott of the March of Dimes campaign as the feature for the final week in Woodburn to raise funds to combat infantile paralysis. The drive opened here last Thursday under the sponsorship of the Rotary club.

The site for the "Mile of Dimes" event will be along the sidewalk on Front street in Woodburn between Hayes and Garfield streets. An effort will be made to obtain enough donations of dimes and other coins during the day to reach the length of the block when placed edge to edge. Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts, under the direction of Perry Williams, neighborhood commissioner, will be in charge and the cooperation of the public is urged.

At Woodburn high school the campaign opened Friday morning with a special assembly and each student was given a folder with spaces to hold five dimes to be returned when filled. A similar campaign is planned at the Washington school while the Lincoln school has a milk bottle in each room to receive dimes, conduct a benefit basketball game at the high school between team.

Chairman Merriott also announced that the Marion corps recruiting with its loud speaker would be in Woodburn Saturday calling attention to the fund raising campaign. Members of the local Camp Fire girl group are also collecting for the drive.

Public donations to the fund may be placed in milk bottles at local stores or may be left with or mailed to the local chairman at the Portland General Electric Co., office in Woodburn.

Election Favored For Flood Control

Pratum—A large crowd of land owners met at Pratum school to discuss the proposed Pudding river control district and reached an agreement that petitions should request Marion county court to call an election on the issue. Four farmers volunteered to circulate such petitions. They are J. J. Thompson, Oscar Meyer, Eldon Wenger, Cornelius Bateson.

Some men, who had signed the original petition requesting a district formation, understood that the district would have power only to negotiate with the federal government for a \$110,000 grant for river clearance, but learned later that such a district could tax and assess land owners under certain conditions for irrigation flood control and drainage projects. Cornelius Bateson introduced Attorney Peery Burden of Salem who explained legal aspects of the new state law authorizing formation of such districts. Manton Carl of Hubbard, Ore., conducted the meeting.

Bruce Cooley Named For Dallas Council

Dallas—Bruce Cooley was elected councilman from ward one at the meeting of the city council to fill the vacancy created by the death of Cecil L. Riggs.

Cooley has been in Dallas for about two years, coming here from Salem, and is the owner of Cooley's Furniture store. His term will expire December 31 of this year unless he is re-elected to the position.

Licenses Approved By Jefferson 'Dads'

A total of \$630 was raised for the European relief besides an additional \$300 that was collected by the Grace Mennonite church in a separate drive. The Grace church funds were not used to buy any potatoes but will go with other money raised within the denomination for the purchase of other foodstuffs.
