

Farmers Union Co-op Gaining

Jefferson—At a special meeting of the members of the Marion-Linn Farmer Union Co-op held at the Masonic hall, the auditor's report was presented by Laurence Rich of Salem which showed an increase of \$56,300 in the marketing department and \$20,000 in the purchasing or store department. The association has a net profit of \$8,676, after the expenses were paid.

The expansion program during the summer included the erection of a store building 25x108 feet south of the warehouse at the north city limits, and an 87 x 96 addition to the warehouse. A new Fairbanks-Morse scales has also been installed. This additional space gives more chance to handle the grain with less expense.

The business at the store has increased since the store and warehouse are close together which eliminates the handling of grain twice.

A turkey dinner was served by the women of the Sidney Talbot Union.

The annual meeting will be held on the second Wednesday in May, and at that time new directors will be elected.
