Season Brings Fire in Ferns

Dallas—Two weeks of cold, dry weather have brought on an early fern fire season, according to foresters in the district warden's office here.

Already a crew from the Dallas station has battled three large fern fires, two in Lincoln county and one in Benton county. Two calls Sunday took them to Eddyville and Burnt Woods in Lincoln county with acreage on the former estimated at about 150 acres. A Monday fire, caused by smoker's carelessness, was at Blodgett.

Damage with the fern fires hits green seedlings and destroys evergreen reproduction. The office reported that Tuesday night was the coldest night in Dallas yet this year with the mercury dropping to 19.8 degrees. Friday night was the only night in two weeks that it failed to freeze with the thermometer hitting the low mark of 34.7 degrees.

Not a drop of precipitation has been recorded in over two weeks.
