

Mill to Keep Usual Schedule

Lebanon—Reduction of sulphite processing to a nine-month schedule, necessitating a summer shutdown at the Crown-Zellerbach mill will not be necessary this year, George Gallaway, resident manager, announced.

Proposals presented at the state sanitary authority hearing in Portland last Friday, revealed Crown-Zellerbach was considering reducing sulphite production at the Lebanon mill to a nine-month schedule in order to prevent the discharge of sulphite liquors into the Santiam river during low water.

Before the plan could go into effect, a new boiler and additional digester would be needed to accelerate pulp production during a shortened pulp operations period, Gallaway pointed out. At present this equipment's installation is planned late this spring and the Lebanon plant will not reduce its pulp production this year, the manager said.

"We are not certain that a reduced schedule will apply even in 1949 because alternative checks against stream pollution remain for thorough consideration," Gallaway said.

"All mills in the industry are extremely interested in the magnesium base process for sulphite pulp production and should its use in actual plant operation prove practical, it may provide the answer to stream pollution by sulphite liquor," he observed.

Installation of the new boiler and digester is necessary at the Lebanon plant to insure adequate pulp for the plant's paper production needs. This equipment could be used to allow reduced operation of the pulp mill but if some other means of preventing stream pollution is accepted, it would be valuable in full-time operations, Gallaway concluded.

Impounded Pooches Face Early Death

Albany—Liberty may mean death to dogs in Albany henceforth, E. R. Conn, assistant chief of police warned. The new poundmaster will enforce strictly the city ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large, the police officer stated.

Albany Wealthy In Early Lore

Albany—Albany's wealth of pioneer landmarks, historical background and legendary lore provides ample material for centenary observances almost every year, Arthur Kirkham, director of radio station KOIN, Portland, suggested to more than 120 members of the Albany Chamber of Commerce at its Albany Centennial kick-off meeting.

Kirkham pointed to a number of local landmarks, stressing the old Montiehi residence, now standing at 518 West Second street, between Calapooia and Washington streets; the old grist mill, constructed in 1851; the first Linn courthouse, built in 1853; the first landing of the S. S. Multnomah; the first school, established in 1855, and the first church constructed in 1857.

Mr. Kirkham also noted that Albany was the birthplace of the republican party in Oregon and mentioned the heated controversies that arose between the two major parties during and after the Civil War.

The Montiehi home, built around the original Montiehi cabin, erected in 1848, when Walter and Thomas Montiehi came here from their homes in Albany, N. Y., should be made a shrine by the people of Albany, Kirkham suggested, for it typifies the spirit of Albany's founders.

Lottie Montiehi Pipe, one of Albany's oldest residents, makes her home at Ninth and Ferry streets. Her home, built by the early Montiehi pioneers, is a veritable storehouse of heirlooms and antiques, brought here by the Montiehis when the town was founded.
