Missionaries Killed by Reds

New York, Feb. 6 (AP)—The Rev. Calvert Alexander, editor of the Jesuit Missions magazine, charged today that Chinese communists are killing all American missionaries captured in northern China—both Catholic and Protestant.

The statement was made in an interview with the editors of the magazine released the first documented charges against the communists in connection with the campaign against the church in the communist-occupied areas. The campaign was highlighted recently by the mass air evacuation of missionaries from behind communist lines.

The report charge: 1. That 49 Catholic priests and lay brothers had been "executed, murdered or tortured to death" by Chinese communists in the last two years. 2. That all church property was being seized for communist use. 3. Church leaders are being arrested, fined, expelled, imprisoned or executed.

Freedom Train Here April 6

Slated originally to visit Salem March 30, the Freedom Train will not arrive here until six days later. This was the word received early Friday morning by the mayor's Freedom Train chairman, Dave Hoss, from John Rae of Portland, area director of the American Heritage foundation.

The train will have a lay-over for mechanical check-up and repairs in California before arriving in Oregon and will be in Portland April 1 and 2. From there the train goes to Eugene April 3, then to Corvallis April 4 and back to Salem April 5 and here April 6. It will arrive in Salem the preceding day but will not be open to the public on that day.

\$510 Million for China Program

Washington, Feb. 6 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall's global strategy for peace appears likely to meet a critical test in congress over his aid for China program.

Officials have disclosed that this program calls for \$510,000,000 of American assistance to the Chinese government during the 15 months beginning April 1.

While the sum is considerably larger than the \$300,000,000 Marshall previously suggested informally, it is expected to encounter criticism, both in and out of congress, from advocates of much greater help.

Another aspect which may draw critical fire is the reported lack of any provision for military assistance for the Chinese nationalist forces battling Chinese communists over a large area.

The China program may go to congress within a week or so, while the lawmakers still are studying details of the Marshall plan for European recovery.

However, the relationship between the size of the Chinese program and the \$6,800,000,000 European program is described by authorities as reflecting the basic strategy which Marshall is applying to the problem of world recovery.

Greece Orders Attack on Subs

Athens, Feb. 6 (AP)—The Greek navy ministry today ordered its warships to attack and sink all unidentified submarines in Greek territorial waters.

The order followed the reported appearance of two strange submarines.

One was reported between the Peloponnese and Crete, and another off the coast of Preveza, in the Ionian sea. Preveza is primarily a supply port of Epirus.

Troop and supply ships now are being escorted by destroyers and corvettes equipped with depth charges.

Official sources said the submarine reported seen between Peloponnese and Crete was said to have attempted to make contact with a caïque and approached her, but submerged before reaching the vessel.

Meanwhile the ministry of public order, said a guerrilla band of eighty to 100 fighters clashed with gendarmerie units of Pyli village on Mount Parnes, only 11 miles from Athens. The mountain is clearly visible from Athens.

The ministry said the guerrilla unit was part of a band from Mount Parnassos which has been moving southward from several days.

Self-Rationing Now Effective

Washington, Feb. 6 (AP)—The government reported signs today that its campaign to cut spending for scarce foods is off to a running start.

The agriculture department said a review of market trends since the first of the year shows widespread resistance by housewives to the high price of butter and choice meat cuts.

Demand for meat in some areas, the report said, has turned "sluggish." Consumers are showing more interest in cow and chuck beef, veal and lamb, less in steaks and roasts from top grade steers.

In the dairy markets the demand for butter fell off more sharply than usual after the year-end holidays, the department found. It said high prices were a factor.

Secretary Anderson said yesterday self-rationing of this kind is one way to put the brakes on inflation of food prices.

"The high cost of living is so serious that we cannot afford to do nothing while waiting for legislation to deal with the problem," Anderson declared.

He spoke to a score of consumer, food industry and farm representatives who will advise the government on its nationwide voluntary self-rationing program.

House Furnishing Prices Excessive

Fear that advancing costs are "pricing dealers in house furnishings out of the market" was expressed during the recent furniture market convention held in San Francisco.

This information was brought back to Salem by Robert L. Elstrom, Court street merchant and city mayor, one of several local dealers who were in the bay area to see the latest in merchandise. Others in attendance were Carl Hogg, Don Woody and Herbert Stiff, Jr.

While recognizing that manufacturers have their own problems of higher costs for raw materials and labor, retailers are confronted with a situation where they may encounter so much buying resistance that merchandise will remain on their floors, Elstrom reported.

Dr. Coffin, who is internationally known, spent more than six months in 1946 and 1947 in China, India, the Philippines, Siam and the Near East.

He was graduated from Yale in 1897 and Union Theological seminary in 1900. In New York City he was for 20 years pastor of one of the largest Presbyterian churches in the metropolitan area, and was president of Union Theological seminary from 1926 to 1945. In World War I he was in overseas religious work.

He has received honorary degrees from Harvard, Princeton, the University of Glasgow, University of Paris, Jewish Theological seminary and other institutions.

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Refuse to Clear Speculators

Washington, Feb. 6 (AP)—A senate committee refused again today to clear Edwin W. Pauley and Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham of any implication that they used "inside information" in commodity trading.

Senator Knowland (R-Calif.), acting chairman of the appropriations sub-committee, announced the vote was 3 to 2 against a proposal by Senator Green (D-R.I.) to absolve them. The committee has been investigating speculation on commodity markets.

Pauley is special assistant to Secretary of the Army Royall and Graham is President Truman's personal physician. Both have told of speculating in commodities but insisted they never had information from government "insiders" to guide them.
