Vetville Name For Project

Salem's veterans' housing project was given the name Vetville and a tentative constitution formulated at the first meeting of the project's recently elected council held Thursday night at the Paulus cannery.

The constitution would establish the method of succession to vacant courts in the colony with priority given to families with children, and provide that all evictions from the project will be passed on by the council. In regard to this the constitution would provide for a tenant to first be sent a correction notice when a legitimate complaint is brought. If the complaint is not corrected a second correction notice would be sent and if no attempt is made after this by the tenant to remedy the complaint a notice of the eviction would be given.

During its Thursday night session the council voted to hold public meetings on the second and fourth Mondays of each month. The meetings, until the canning season opens, will be held in the Paulus Cannery warehouse.

Mill City Dump Purchase Held-up

Proceedings by the state highway department toward selling to Mill City for dump ground purposes a three-acre piece off from a 28-acre tract of land the state bought from the county in 1942 will be held up pending an investigation by state and county engineers as to how this proposed dump ground will lie in reference to the proposed part of the north Santiam highway from Mill City to Mehama on the Marion county side.

When a letter was received earlier in the week by Judge Grant Murphy from Joseph DeSouza of the state highway department legal staff asking the county to relinquish a right it had retained in the land to take gravel off of it, the county judge raised the question as to whether the land proposed for the city dumps in such a manner as to be an encroachment when the new highway is completed. He finally got in touch with DeSouza Friday and arrangements were made to delay the transaction with Mill City until a more complete inspection can be had of the premises.

Takes Swing at Champion Louis

New York, Feb. 13 (AP)—A 50-year-old Irishman made an unsuccessful bid for Joe Louis' heavyweight title in an unscheduled, punchless tiff at a Broadway night club early today.

Thomas Delaney, the Irishman, landed on the floor after taking a wild swing at Louis' jaw. Witnesses agreed the champion didn't hit his challenger.

Before the swing, Delaney told the champion: "So you're Joe Louis. Well, I'm going to beat Walcott to the title. I'm going to become the first Irish heavyweight champion of the world."

Louis and his party were leaving the Ebony club at 3 a.m. when the challenge was issued. Marshall Miles, the champion's manager, commented Delaney fell "apparently from the wind we caused by getting out of there so quickly."

Delaney, a six-foot, 200-pounder, refused to give his address to police, who let him go with a warning.

As for Louis, he was heard to say as he entered his car, "foolish fellow."

Deaths Increase In Palestine War

Jerusalem, Feb. 13 (AP)—The Jewish quarter of Rehavia and the business sector of Zion Square in Jerusalem were placed out of bounds to British troops today. There was mounting tension over police reports of the deaths last night of four Jews.

Police said they found the Jews' bodies near Stephens gate in the old city shortly after the four reportedly were picked up by British troops at a presumed Jewish gunpost. The British said they released the Jews after brief questioning.

The circumstances of their deaths have not been disclosed. Police said five Arabs were killed and 12 wounded last night when Hagana, the Jewish militia, made a heavy bomb attack on the Arab village of Abu Kebir. Hagana said its men made a similar sortie against the Arab village of Yazur.

The unofficial Palestine death toll since the United Nations decision to partition the Holy Land last Nov. 29 now stands at 1181.

Influenza Strikes Many Linn Schools

Albany—Influenza has become so prevalent throughout Linn county that Wednesday approximately 20 percent of all school pupils were reported absent from their classes, because of illness, according to Dr. A. D. Blanchat, Linn county health officer.

Thus far, however, only one school was reported closed. The Grand Prairie school near the southern city limits of Albany has been closed until Monday because more than 20 pupils of the 66 enrolled were ill.

Dr. Blanchat said that only a few cases of pneumonia have been reported and influenza attackers are not alarming. He is not recommending the closing of schools.

No Holding Tax on Wages of Mexicans

Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)—Rep. Anderson (R., Calif.) said today the internal revenue bureau has ruled that wages of Mexican farm laborers in the United States are not subject to withholding tax.

Anderson said the bureau held that Mexican farm workers are to be construed as entering and leaving the country frequently.

Therefore, he added, the 30 percent withholding tax on wages of non-resident aliens will not apply to such workers.

However, he said, if the Mexican laborers earn more than \$500 in a year, or up to the time they leave the United States, they must get "tax clearance" by filing the departing aliens tax return and pay whatever income tax is due.

Anderson said the bureau's ruling was made this week after an inquiry from the Progressive Growers' association of San Jose, Calif.
