

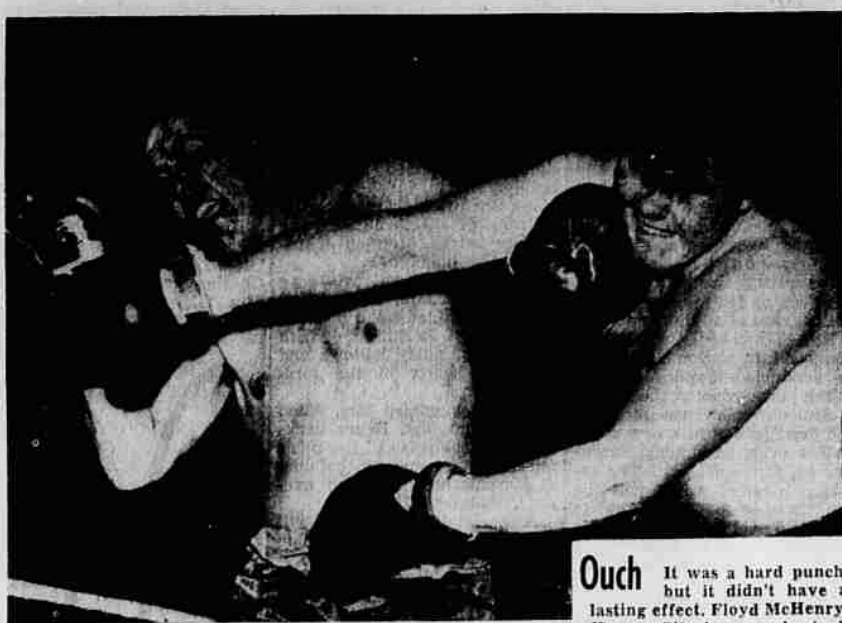
Hauk Announces Lineup Shift For Frosh Tilt

The Frosh tilt, originally scheduled for 4 p.m., has been changed to a 6:15 p.m. curtain raiser for the Duck-Vandal contest.



California Bears to Enter Hoop Crucials

San Francisco, Feb. 13 (AP)—California, tabbed by Pacific coast experts as the nation's best college basketball team, tonight takes on Southern California in the first of two games that could clinch the 1948 Southern division championship for the Golden Bears.

Re-opening the Southern hoop race after a three-week layoff, California's high-scoring league leaders risk a seven-game victory skunk against the Trojans tonight and UCLA's defending champions Saturday night.

Stanford, the bottom rung quintet among the "big four" of the Coast conference, reverses the two-night billing by taking on the Uclans tonight and Southern Cal Saturday.

In the jumbled northern division struggle, Oregon and Idaho get the only workout in a pair of week-end games that will decide nothing but the winner. Oregon is solidly buried in fourth place and the Vandals are cemented in the cellar with only two victories in eight games. They play at Eugene, Ore.

Washington State, northern division leader, and the second-place Huskies take a breather until their clash at Pullman on Feb. 20-21. Oregon State also is idle until next Monday and Tuesday, when the '47 coast champs play Idaho.

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Northwest Hoopers Reduce Point Work as Season Wanes

Seattle, Feb. 13 (AP)—The slam-bang boys of the Pacific Northwest basketball slowed up a bit during the past week to catch their breath, but even so high Harry McLaughlin of Pacific Lutheran pushed his season total to an even 400 points for 24 games.

Dropping under his average of 17 per outing, McLaughlin counted 26 points in two games to remain comfortably in front of the pack. Well back but still in second with 358 was Bob Johnson of Willamette. Cliff Crandall of Oregon state headed the northern division contingent with 316.

In the northern division race itself, Washington's Jack Nichols stumbled in the week-end tussles with Oregon State but clung to top spot. For his nine conference games Nichols has 143 points. Roger Wiley of Oregon edged around Vince Hanson of Washington state into second spot with 125 counters to Hanson's 123.

Only Crandall, Nichols and Wiley figured in the over-all picture as small college aces continued to dominate the scoring race. Willamette and Portland each contributed two to the top 10, with one each coming from Whitworth, Central Washington and Pacific Lutheran.

In the division picture, Wiley could take over top spot by collecting 19 points in the Oregon-Idaho series tonight (Friday) and Saturday. Both Nichols and Hanson will be idle until next week. The leaders (through games of Feb. 10):

Tarzan Ousted Collegian Sets New Swim Mark

Iowa City, Ia., Feb. 13 (AP)—Johnny Weismuller's 22-year-old national record for the 100-yard free style swimming event was beaten last night by Wally Ris, Iowa's star swimmer from Chicago.

Ris made the distance in 51.9, trimming a tenth of a second off the record Weismuller set for the Illinois Athletic club in a Seattle, Wash., meet in 1925. His time also set a new international collegiate record, previously held by Dick Weinberg of the University of Michigan.

Ris made his record swim in a meet in which Iowa beat Minnesota 58 to 26.

Frisco Hits Coach Through Pro Ranks

San Francisco, Feb. 13 (AP)—The football eligibility ruckus kicked up by Coach Ed McKeever at the University of San Francisco showed signs today of following him into professional football.

President Tony Morabito of the San Francisco 49ers is en route to Chicago with demands for an investigation by the All America conference of the "white paper" on USF football which McKeever left behind when he became coach of the Chicago Rockets.

After coaching as USF for a year McKeever abruptly resigned last month to take the pro team job and wrote a widely circulated letter in which he questioned eligibility of 22 USF players and said money was paid to some of the Dons.

Morabito left last night for a week-end meeting of officials of the All America conference, of which the 49ers and Rockets are members.

"I'll say plenty about this at the meeting," Morabito said.

He said he considered McKeever's action "my business and I don't like it."

"We're trying to build good will — not tear it down," Morabito added. "He is one of us and people can't help but ask: 'What kind of coaches do you hire?'"

Asked if he believed McKeever's job with the Rockets would be endangered, Morabito said: "This certainly won't enhance it."

University of San Francisco officials meanwhile returned a heavy fire of "sneer" charges at McKeever.

Button's victory gave him a clean sweep of the "Big Three" figure skating championships. Previously, the handsome American youth had won the European title at Prague, Czechoslovakia, Jan. 14, and the Olympic championship at St. Moritz last week.

Button finished second to defending champion Hans Gerschwiler of Switzerland yesterday in the compulsory figures, first half of the competition, but won the title with a brilliant exhibition in today's free skating events, regarded as his specialty. Gerschwiler, who finished second to Button in the European title meet and in the Olympics, also placed second in the world championships.
