## Turkish Journalist Tells Of Problems of Nation

Ismet Sanli, vivacious and attractive Turkish woman, won for her native country a host of friends Thursday night when she addressed a capacity crowd of Knife and Fork club members during a dinner meeting at the Marion. Blessed with a sense of humor and a personality that was all that could be desired, Miss Sanli, who said she preferred to be known as a journalist rather than a political scientist, spoke gravely concerning Turkey's stand during the recent World war and of the difficult situation the republic faces as being the dividing line between communism and western civilization. Interlaced were bits of sparkling wit and humorous stories concerning her experiences as a world traveler.

Communism has not been able to get a foothold in Turkey, said Miss Sanli because it has been outlawed in that country. She added that individual communists were not molested as long as they did not try to organize a party. However, agitators quickly find themselves in jail.

Miss Sanli urged members of her audience to study history, to learn both sides of an argument. Such procedure might, she added, eliminate difficulties before they reached the breaking point. Speaking of Turkey's strategic position astride the Bosphorus between the Black and Marmara seas, as well as the Dardanelles, Miss Sanli asserted Russian commerce passed through those waters unrestricted.

Having fought for centuries under the Ottoman empire, the Turks after forming a republic did an about face in 1923 and decided they would try peaceful means. This policy was the principal reason the country adopted a policy of a non-belligerent al-

ly of Great Britain during the recent World war. But Turkey is not pacifistic, Miss Sanli said, pointing to the million men now under arms.

Free education from the first grade through a master's degree in college is provided by the republic and numbers of women are serving in the country's legislative body, Miss Sanli said, as she spoke of the reforms introduced since the Ottoman empire was abandoned.
