

Building Unions Get Pay Raise

Portland, Ore., March 6 (AP)—Four building trades unions won a 1 1/2-cent hourly wage increase here yesterday in an arbitration award.

The increase lifted wages for AFL Ironworkers throughout Oregon and in five southwestern Washington counties, including the Longview area, from \$1.75 to \$1.92 1/2.

A formula provide for \$5 a day subsistence for out-of-town work also was approved.

Pay of AFL carpenters in Portland went from \$1.75 to \$1.92 1/2. For AFL laborers and teamsters in Portland it went from \$1.35 to \$1.52 1/2.

The increases do not apply to upstate areas, except for the ironworkers.

The award also was expected to lead to settlement of a dispute between employers and AFL operators of pile drivers. The union operators traditionally have received 10 cents more than carpenters. They have been in dispute with employers over a pay increase.

\$8000 Hoard of Gold in Ireland

Dublin, March 6 (AP)—Three Irish woods workers, aided by a family of rabbits, have uncovered a hoard of gold coins believed buried by an Irish army paymaster when Oliver Cromwell invaded the Emerald Isle three centuries ago, it was reported today.

The hoard, tentatively valued at \$8,000 but worth much more at present day gold prices, was found in the woods near Port Arlington, 40 miles west of Dublin, last week.

The three men who found the coins—Joe Clarke, Joe Maher and Mike Daly—were awarded \$1,200 each for surrendering the coins to the national museum.

Clarke and Maher said they found the hoard when they saw a rabbit drop something at the mouth of its burrow while they were passing with a load of timber.

They investigated and discovered that the rabbits were housecleaning their burrow of gold coins. Digging, they found hundreds of coins in a pile with a few remnants of a wooden box nearby.

Mike Daly came in for a share of the reward the next day when he investigated deeper and found another 51 coins.

The most recent coin in the collection was dated 1651. It was a Cromwellian unit valued at the time as a sovereign. It was still bright, indicating it had been buried soon after minting.

The hoard was found in what was called the "pale" area of Ireland, beyond which Catholics were prohibited to go in Cromwell's time on his orders.

Dr. W. O'Sullivan, coin expert of the national museum, said it was highly probable that the hoard was buried by the treasurer of the Irish army which retreated before Cromwell.

Churchill Sees Third World War

London, March 6 (AP)—Winston Churchill said today:

"Any thinking man can see that we are all moving into a terrible situation at home and abroad. Not only bankruptcy and privation approach us in this island, but the menace of a third world war rolls toward us with every act of Russian imperialist aggression and communist violence and intrigue."

The former prime minister gave these views in a letter to Frank Harris, conservative candidate in a by-election at North Croydon.

Farley Predicts Heavy Wallace Vote

New York, March 6 (AP)—Former Postmaster General James A. Farley predicts that Henry A. Wallace's third party bid for the White House will poll some 8,000,000 votes next November. And, he says, "from half a mil-

lion to a million" of them will come from New York.

Wallace, the one-time national democratic chairman said last night, "is more of a threat to the democratic party than the democratic leaders realize."

He was interviewed on the Mutual "Meet the Press" radio program during which he said flatly that he was not a candidate for office in 1948, "neither for the presidency, nor the vice-presidency."

"In my judgment, President Truman will be the nominee of his party," Farley declared.

To Call Sewer Bond Election

At the city council meeting Monday night ordinance bills will be introduced calling two special elections, both for May 21.

One will be the \$815,000 sewer bond measure. The other will be an annexation measure involving an area south of the city between market road No. 91 and South 22nd street, Market road No. 91 is an extension of South 12th street.

The area is one that was in a district whose residents rejected annexation last year.

An ordinance bill had been prepared to put a special tax measure on the ballot for alteration of City hall, but it has been decided to keep the bill of the ballot this year.

All members of the city council whose terms expire with the end of this year had Saturday filed as candidates for re-election. So far they have no opposition.

The last to file was Alderman Claude Jorgensen, whose address is 472 North Liberty and who represents Ward 3. Those who had previously filed are Alderman Howard Maple, Ward 7; James H. Nicholson, Ward 1; and David O'Hara, Ward 5.

Mayor Robert L. Elfstrom was early to file as a candidate to succeed himself and is unopposed so far. Neither is Paul H. Hauser opposed for re-election as city treasurer. He filed several weeks ago.

The race for city judge is a three-way affair with W. W. McKinney, incumbent, William H. Crawford and Peery T. Buren the candidates.

Clinics Slated In Woodburn

Woodburn—Two free clinics, one on dental examination for children in the first four grades of the Lincoln grade school and the other the monthly health clinic for babies, will be held Tuesday, sponsored by the Marion county department of health.

The dental clinic will start at 9 o'clock at the Lincoln school and will include the children of the first four grades of that school. A local dentist will be in charge assisted by a local committee. Mothers interested are urged to visit the clinic with their children. Examination charts will be prepared for each child and parents will be notified of dental work that should be done. No corrective work will be undertaken.

The health clinic will be conducted as usual at the Woodburn public library beginning at 12:30 o'clock and continuing until 2 o'clock. Health examinations for well babies will be conducted, immunizations given and appointments handled. A local doctor will conduct the clinic assisted by a local volunteer committee.

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Parole Granted Ex-serviceman

Raymond Denzine, ex-serviceman who pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge George R. Duncan Saturday to a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, was sentenced to six months in county jail and paroled on condition he support his family.

Full restitution had been made, it developed for eight or 10 checks passed totalling \$118.95.

His attorney, Joe Devers, Jr., said the man has a wife and two children, that he does not drink and the money was secured for support of his family. This was confirmed in a statement by Lawrence Osterman, deputy district attorney, who said the family had become destitute while Denzine was awaiting a chance to get back into the military service. This was shown to be his first offense.

Everett E. Drake on plea of guilty to nonsupport of his wife and two children was sentenced to a year in jail, paroled to the state parole board and the condition imposed he pay \$15 a week toward their support starting March 20. Drake's case on a similar charge was before the grand jury in 1945 which returned a not true bill.

Judge Duncan also signed a revocation order of a parole granted Floyd Witt August 22, 1947, from a sentence of six months in jail on a charge of lewd and lascivious cohabitation. Shirley Curry, the woman in the case, was sentenced at that time in district court to 90 days in jail, but sentence was suspended as she had a ticket to California and she was put on the train headed in that direction.

Douglas county officers notified officers here that the same pair is under arrest at Roseburg. One of the conditions of Witt's parole was that he pay \$35 a month for support of a child and the application for revocation indicates that has not been complied with.

Governor Moves In Against KKK
Atlanta, March 6 (AP)—Gov. M. E. Thompson in a strong stand against the Ku Klux Klan today called for laws to end its "meetings of intimidation."

The Georgia governor accused the Klan of delivering the south "into the hands of our enemies," and accused the hooded secret order of aiding communism and "race baiters."

His denunciation of the Klan was coupled with a restatement of his opposition to proposed federal anti-lynching laws.

The governor referred to recent election-day demonstrations by the Klan in two east-central Georgia counties where Negroes were registered to vote, and declared:

"While our senators and congressmen tell the world that we have enough laws and will enforce them, the Ku Klux Klan by such meetings cut the ground from beneath their feet."

At both rallies, Klan leaders spoke against President Truman's proposed civil right program and declared themselves for "white supremacy."

Thompson characterized the Klan "type of mind" as anti-southern and said the Klan itself was giving "aid to the communists, the race baiters and the racial organizations which are pushing the legislation we deem unwise and unnecessary."

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Howard Belton, state senator, who Saturday filed for republican nomination as state treasurer.

Belton Files For Treasurer

State Senator Howard C. Belton, Canby farmer, Saturday filed his candidacy for state treasurer, becoming the second republican to file for this office.

Already filed is Ormond R. Bean, Portland, and State Senator Walter Pearson, democrat. Sigfred Unander, Portland republican, is expected to file next week.

Belton is now in his third four-year term as senator. He served as acting governor when he was president of the senate and also served two terms on the state emergency board.

Belton, who is 55 years of age, has engaged in farming and marketing his farm products for 33 years. Mr. and Mrs. Belton are the parents of four children of whom their two older sons saw active service during the recent war.

Senator Belton is familiar with state finances through membership on the senate ways and means committee during two of his senate terms.

Dog License Demand Keeps Force Busy

Dallas—Edna M. Pitzer, county clerk, and her staff have been working at a rush pace to keep up with the last-minute demand for dog licenses. About 900 have been issued in the past two weeks.

Deadline for procuring licenses without payment of a penalty was March 1. A few days prior to that time only 790 had been issued. A check through March 2 reveals that 1635 were issued as compared with 1705 at the same time last year.

The penalty of 2 dollars per license is now applicable and will be charged in addition to the regular fee.

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Condon Files Again Sought

Washington, March 6 (AP)—Voicing impeachment threats, Rep. Rankin (D., Miss.) today demanded that government executives let congress have the loyalty files on Dr. Edward U. Condon.

Rankin said in a statement that Secretary of Commerce Harriman should be ordered to give the house un-American activities committee the files on Condon or else resign.

Rankin also said Attorney General Clark should be fired if he advised against letting the committee have the information.

Without naming any names, he said congress may have to impeach "some of these tight-fisted bureaucrats who are protecting people on the federal payroll."

Condon is the federal bureau of standards director accused by the house un-American activities subcommittee of having associated with suspected Soviet spies.

Rep. McDowell (R., Pa.) said Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R., N.J.) of the full committee had agreed to his suggestion that the committee staff "drop everything else to concentrate on the Condon case."

"I feel," he said, "we should hear Condon at once."

Alleged Reds Freed on Bonds

New York, March 6 (AP)—Federal Judge William Bondy today ordered four alleged alien communists released in bail of \$3,500 each pending argument on their appeal from dismissal of habeas corpus writs.

The four men are Gerhart Eisler, described by a congressional committee as America's No. 1 communist; John Williamson, labor secretary of the communist party; Ferdinand Smith, secretary of the CIO National Maritime union; and Charles A. Doyle, an official of the CIO United Gas, Coke and Chemical Workers.

Arguments in the cases are scheduled to be heard by the U.S. circuit court of appeals Monday.

The judge acted after he had dismissed petitions for the habeas corpus writs by the four, who have been on a hunger strike at the Ellis island detention quarters. They have been awaiting deportation proceedings.

Mrs. Snook's Funeral Monday

Funeral services will be held at the W. T. Rigdon chapel Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Mrs. Emma Snook, Salem resident for many years, who died Friday in Corvallis at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. N. Travers. Interment will follow in the City View cemetery.

Born at Mildred Hall, Sussex county, England, April 3, 1864, Emma Morley came to America at the age of eight years and with her family settled in Abilene, Kas. January 1, 1884, she was married to the late Harmon Snook and the couple moved to Salem in 1891. On their arrival they built their residence at 1097 South Liberty street, where they made their home until the death in 1940 of Mr. Snook, a contractor who was in charge of the construction of a number of college buildings at Oregon State college and University of Oregon, Eaton hall at Willamette university and several county courthouses in Oregon.

Mrs. Snook was a member of the First Christian church of Salem.
