

DC-6 Planes Go Back to Service

Nation-wide resumption of service by the modified and greatly improved Douglas DC-6 is planned within the next two weeks, it was announced jointly today by the Douglas Aircraft company and five major operators—American, United, Panagra, National and Braniff. The information reached the United Air Lines offices in Salem Friday.

American Airlines will resume DC-6 service from coast to coast March 15. United Air Lines will first place the DC-6's back on its San Francisco-Honolulu route March 21 and on its coast to coast route April 1. National Airlines plans resumption of service between Miami and New York March 20 and Braniff International Airways will announce early in April a specific date for resumption of Houston-San Antonio, Dallas-Kansas City-Chicago DC-6 service.

Ninety-seven of the big 300-mile-an-hour luxury planes were voluntarily grounded by airline operators last November following an accident to one at Bryce Canyon, Utah, and the emergency safe landing of another at Gallup, New Mexico.

Improvements in the plane will be the result of an intensive study by more than 200 of the nation's top airline, government and aircraft engineers and pilots. Out of the investigation came a lengthy list of modifications.

Liquor Sales Up In This County

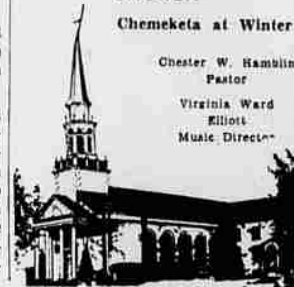
Sales in the state liquor stores and agencies in Marion county were \$40,034.80 higher during the last six months of the same year, according to an analysis made by the state liquor control commission.

Total liquor sales in the county during the last six months of the year totaled \$994,167.35 as compared with \$943,132.75 in the first six month period.

Clatsop and Jackson counties recorded the largest sales in the state outside of Multnomah county. The liquor sales in Clatsop county rose from \$718,648.25 in the first six months of 1947 to \$1,236,849.80 in the last

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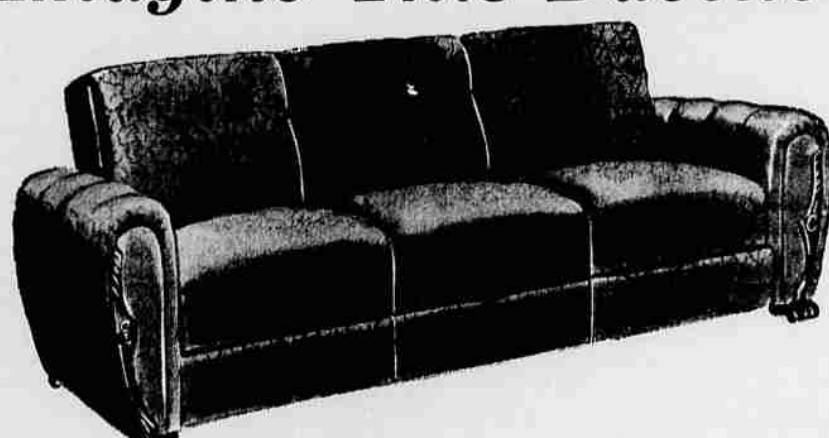
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
