The 36th anniversary of Girl Scouts in the United States was observed Friday, March 12, with a nation-wide "giving party," featuring the "Seeds of Peace" project and "Clothes for Friendship."

The "Seeds of Peace" kit project is in co-operation with the national council of State Garden clubs. Each kit contains 13 kinds of vegetables and one packet of flower seeds. Each kit contains enough seeds to plant approximately 600 square feet of ground, enough to sustain a family of five.

Girl Scout troop 5, Mrs. Lewis Mosier leader, troop 4, Mrs. Mark Astrup leader, troop 27, Mrs. Glen Fox leader, troop 91, Mrs. B. F. Fletcher leader, troop 50, Mrs. Paul Bale, leader, troop 51, Mrs. E. H. Beal leader, and troop 81, Miss Peggy Skonetzne, leader, have all purchased the "Seeds of Peace" kits. An anonymous gift of \$5 has been given toward the project.

The Girl Scouts are preparing and sending friendship gifts of clothing to destitute children in Europe and Asia as a year long project with a nationwide goal of one million garments.

Salem Girl Scout troops have already sent many kits to Europe, each kit containing ten garments, and are for children between the ages of 1 to 14 years. The wardrobes are attractive as well as utilitarian, so that children who might otherwise wear rags will have clothes they will be proud of.

The American Friends Service committee is handling distribution of the garments over seas.

Mrs. Homer Smith, Jr., Salem district Girl Scout association chairman, said she was proud of the way the Salem Girl Scouts have worked on these two most worthy projects, and commented how eager the Girl Scouts are to do their share to keep peace throughout the world.
