Because we have been an admirer of Slat's Gill's basketball cunning, we dislike to admit it, but one could scarcely be honest if he didn't acknowledge Washington's right to represent the northern division in the Pacific coast conference court finals. The Huskies should not have been compelled to take on an extra game to decide the issue, because they potentially were the best of the lot. Strangely enough it was the Idaho Vandals who were responsible for tossing the Huskies and Beavers into a post season contest. The Vandals took one game each from Oregon State and Washington. Had either quint made a clean sweep of the Idaho series it would have been in.

The fact that the Beavers were able to finish the coaching in a deadlock with the Huskies is a tribute to the coaching ability of Slat's Gill. Given more than a second division finish at the outset of the season Gill's sophomore-dominated Beavers surprised by winning 10 out of 16 conference starts. The only club that had the whammy on the Orangemen was Oregon whose Webfoots won three out of four encounters. Next year? All except Norm Carey are eligible for competition. Sophomores on the club are Dick Ballantyne, Jim Catterall, Ward Paldanius, Len Rinearsen, Paul Sliper, Ken Storey, Dan Torrey, Tom Holman and Jack DeTour. Cliff Crandall, Ernie Neal, Alex Peterson and Frank Roelandt are juniors.

Oregon loses four members of this year's squad but Roger Wiley, 6-foot-8 center, will return for another season. Reedy Berg, Al Popple, Dick Wilkins and Stan Williamson played their last interscholastic game when they downed Oregon State last week. Williamson finished four years of competition. Bob Amacher, who equals Wiley's height if not his left will be a junior next year as will Bob Lavey, Ken Seeborg, Paul Cooper, Bob Don and Lynn Hamilton.

Prices that prevailed for last year's state high school court tournery will be in effect this year at Eugene. This means 10 bucks for an adult's season ticket; \$3.50 for students; adult single admissions Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday night \$1.50; Friday and Saturday night reserved seats \$2.40; all afternoon games \$1.20 for adults. Prices include tax. Single admissions for students are 60 cents for afternoon and 90 cents for evenings, exclusive of tax.

The grass has been trimmed a couple times, benches repainted, tickets secured and a lot of other details cared for as Business Manager George Emigh and his workers ready Waters Park for the opening of the Western International baseball season the night of April 16. The physical plant will be in tiptop condition and Emigh declares that "we will be in much better shape than when we opened a year ago" in the matter of performance of the layers. Confirmation of this comes from Riverside, Calif., where a number of men who will find themselves in Solon uniforms are now in training.

The Senators will be provided with brand new uniforms for use at home and on the road. They are of the same color and design as those of a year ago. . . . Loss of baseballs over the grandstand has been a constant source of irritation to the front office. A few were retrieved by park personnel but they couldn't compete with a gang of boys who waited for the pellets along 25th street. The situation was partly remedied last season through the placing of a high screen immediately back of home plate. Additional screen has been erected and Emigh believes the cost will be returned in salvaged balls in short order.

Tickets for the opening night will go on sale late this month. Reservations for the boxes have been under way for some time. However, space in this section remains to be had, for use throughout the entire season. The Senators will be quartered at the Corvallis hotel during the training period—March 28-April 15. All arrangements for the use of Oregon State's facilities have been completed and all that remains is to move the athletes in.

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Monmouth Enters B Finals in Tournery

Arlington, March 13 (AP)—Tall Jacksonville and giant-killer Monmouth will clash here tonight for the championship of Oregon's class B high school basketball teams.

Jacksonville gained the finals in the annual tournament for schools smaller than 150 enrollment by downing Umapine perschedule, 51-45.

Little Monmouth got there by pulling the tournery's biggest upset, a 34-33 victory over Tall Union.

The score was tied nine times before Union's Bobcats, who lost in the finals by one point last year, grabbed a 33-32 lead three minutes from the end of the game on Frank Baum's free throw.

But with only 1:45 minutes left Noel Sawtelle of Monmouth took a pass from out of bounds and dribbled the length of the floor for the winning score.

Sawtelle, who starred for Coach Bud Gronquist's team in the win over Drain the day before, tied for game scoring honors with 9 points.

Guard Don Wendt, Jacksonville six-footer, became the tournery's top scorer as he paced his team to the win over Umapine. He ran in 22 points to add to his previous day's total of 19.

Earlier, however, Bob Cellers of Drain had scored 23 points, the highest single-game effort of the tournery to date.

That came in a consolation bracket game in which Drain nosed out Garibaldi, 40-37. Oakridge gained the right to meet Drain in the consolation finals today by edging Madras, 39-38.

Oddly, both teams in the consolation finals are nick-named Warriors.

A preliminary to the championship game tonight will send Union against Umapine for third place in the tournery.

Oakridge's victory was fashioned in the first half. The Warriors gained a 27-15 lead by the intermission. Madras rallied in the final period, led by little Lorin Corwin, who was a stand-out for the second straight day, but the lead was too big to overcome.

Cells also was starring for the second day. He helped Drain to a 20-13 halftime lead and a 29-22, third-period margin. Garibaldi almost closed the gap in the final period, but Drain stayed off the threat.

Kansas City, March 13 (AP)—The fiery Sycamores of Indiana State college, Terre Haute, and the deliberate play-makers of the University of Louisville (Ky.), meet tonight for the national intercollegiate basketball title and a spot in the Olympic playoffs.

Indiana State whipped favored Hamline university of St. Paul, Minn., 66-65, last night. Center Duane Klueh's desperate, one-handed shot swished through net a split-second before the final gun ended an overtime period.

The Louisville Cardinals, playing their usual methodical game, rallied in the last five minutes to beat Xavier university of Cincinnati, 56-49.

Tonight's winner will play in the eight-team Olympic playoff at New York, March 27, 29 and 31 to determine the United States' representative in next summer's world games in London.

Propose Basketball Court Be Named for Slat's Gill

Portland, March 13 (AP)—A move was under way here today to name the new Oregon State college basketball pavilion for Coach Amory T. "Slat's" Gill.

Herbert J. Darby, Portland businessman and University of Oregon graduate started it.

He wrote "Slat's Gill has contributed so much not only to Oregon State, but to the state of Oregon that the board of higher education should name Oregon State's new basketball pavilion 'Gill Court' or 'Amory T. Gill Pavilion.'"

L. H. Gregory, Oregonian sports editor, publicized the suggestion, and recommended its adoption.

"We can't think of a more appropriate name . . . 'Amory T. Slat's Gill basketball pavilion would be just the thing," he said.

The board voted to continue last year's player limit allowing 39 squad members until 30 days after the start of the season when the team will be cut to 25.
