

Draft and UMT Bills Delayed

Washington, April 6 (P)—Hopes faded today of having either temporary draft or universal military training bills ready for the senate this week.

"We'll be lucky if we get a bill by the first of next week," Chairman Gurney (R., S.D.) told reporters after a closed door session of the senate armed services committee.

Gurney said the change in plans for speedy action results from a decision to call in the heads of the three armed services for separate sessions this week.

Gurney said demands of some senators for an immediate increase in airpower had closed down his legislative timetable.

Some senators are demanding that the United States air force be expanded immediately to a 70-group program instead of the 55-group now included in administration plans.

"We plan to call up the air forces first," Gurney said. "Later we will hear from the ground forces and the navy."

"The size of the air force is one of the questions that must be decided before we send a bill on to the senate," Gurney said.

Taft Assails Truman Policies

Lincoln, Neb., April 6 (P)—Senator Taft (R., Ohio) charged today that the Truman administration has continued what he called "the failure in foreign policy . . . of the New Deal administration."

Taft made the assertion in a full dress speech on "America's foreign policy," prepared for delivery before a noontime Rotary club luncheon here.

"We seem to have been dominated by a complete inferiority complex to Russia," he said. "Whatever they asked (at Yalta and Tehran) they received and gave nothing in return."

Bidding for victory in Nebraska's April 13 presidential preference primary, Taft said GOP foreign policy principles could prevail only if both a republican congress and president are elected.

Earlier at Hastings, Taft said he believes a selective draft law may be passed within the next month.

The Ohioan, who heads the GOP senate policy committee, made the observation in a breakfast address here in connection with his campaign to win Nebraska's April 13 free-for-all primary.

"However it will take from 60 to 90 days to set up the machinery for such a draft," he said. "Perhaps by the end of that time there will be enough enlistments so it will not be necessary to activate the law."

Seek to Override Truman's Veto

Washington, April 6 (P)—Rep. Gearhart (R., Calif.) today sought a house vote to override President Truman's veto of a bill excluding some vendors of newspapers and magazines from the social security program.

The Californian, author of the bill, termed the veto a "political action," intended to give the impression the republican party is opposed to social security.

Mr. Truman's veto message, sent to congress yesterday, said the Gearhart bill would open the social security structure "to piecemeal attack and to slow undermining."

The president vetoed a similar bill last year. It was passed the second time by voice vote in the house and senate.

The president contended that the new legislation proposed to remove the old age insurance and unemployment protection from "news vendors who make a full-time job of selling papers and who are dependent on that job for their livelihood."

Son to Oppose Dad for Office

Leoti, Kan., April 6 (P)—Father and son were revealed today as possible political opponents for the same Kansas legislative post on opposite party brackets.

Herb J. (Jack) Barr, Jr., oldest son of the democratic floor leader of the 1947 Kansas house of representatives, announced as a candidate for his father's legislative seat — as a republican.

Whether the elder Barr, major western Kansas rancher and merchant, would seek re-election to a fifth legislative term was not known. He has been mentioned prominently among Kansas democrats as a potential candidate for governor.

Word of the unusual political situation was reported from a neutral corner, by Mrs. Herb J. Barr, wife of the present legislator and mother of the would-be lawmaker.

Congress' Recess Now Up to Stalin

Washington, April 6 (P)—Russian Premier Stalin will decide, indirectly, whether congress can wind up its work on schedule in June.

Speaker Martin (R., Mass.), pointed out to newsmen today the possibility that only a law-making recess may be ordered for the Philadelphia political conventions. In that event congress would return in July for a session that might run through the rest of the year.

The decision—adjournment or recess—will depend, Martin said, on the international situation. He added:

"If the situation remains tense, then we cannot adjourn but will recess for the conventions, come back in July and stay around indefinitely, with a week or so off just before the elections."

Barring some move by Russia, the present legislative program can be disposed of by convention time, he said.

Mounbatten for Moscow

London, April 6 (P)—The Evening News said today that Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin was planning to appoint Earl Mountbatten as British Ambassador to Moscow.

Railroad Wage Offer Rejected

Cleveland, April 6 (P)—General chairmen of three railroad brotherhoods decided today that the president's emergency board recommendations on rules and wages are "not acceptable."

At the same time, they said, the wage and rules committees of three organizations are willing to meet operators of the nation's railroads at an early date for further discussions of the board's recommendations. They set no strike date.

"We further recommend that the negotiations, if arranged, will not be carried on beyond April 27," a statement said. "And that, if an acceptable settlement is not reached in the matter prior to or on April 27, a strike date shall be set as soon thereafter as possible."

The presidential board has recommended a wage increase of 15 1/2 cents an hour. The report had been accepted by the railroads.

Under the railway labor law, a 30-day cooling-off period followed submission of the board's report on March 27. Originally a strike date was set for Feb. 1. The three union had asked wage increases of 30 percent. They represent engineers, firemen and switchmen.

Truckers Stage Sit-Down Strike

Carlisle, Pa., April 6 (P)—Violence was reported today in the unique sitdown strike of a small army of angry truck drivers bivouacked in trucks on Pennsylvania's \$70,000,000 "dream" highway.

Major Charles Keller of the state police announced seven of the truck drivers were fined \$28.50 apiece on charges of throwing stones at two trucks whose drivers refused to join the sitdown.

Keller said the stones damaged new automobiles which were being transported on the two trucks.

The sitdowners said the demonstration on the streamlined Pittsburgh-Harrisburg express highway was a protest against a state weight law.

A committee of truck drivers said they would call on state police at Harrisburg again today with a brief outlining their demands.

Wildcat Strike Closes Hudson Plant

Detroit, April 6 (P)—Hudson Motor Car company reported that several hundred body building workers staged a wildcat walkout today, shutting down its auto plant and idling 11,000 other workers.

The new stoppage came as 19,000 other auto workers returned to their jobs at three plants of the Briggs Body company and the Plymouth division of Chrysler corporation after a brief labor flare-up.

Hudson said its body builders walked out because workers in the paint shop "refused" to sustain production and work necessary overtime.

The company explained that a slowdown in the paint department crippled operations in the body department, causing the body builders to lose work time.

Jews Kill 6 British Soldiers

Jerusalem, April 6 (P)—Jews in military and police uniforms killed six British soldiers and stole arms in a raid on a British army camp south of Haifa today, authorities in Haifa announced.

The slain Britons included the commanding officer of Pardes Hannah camp. A Jewish source in Jerusalem said the underground Irgun Zvai Leumi carried out the attack.

Haifa police said the attackers overpowered the sentry at the gate to the camp, about 25 miles south of Haifa. The sentry was forced into a guardroom, where he and three others were stood against a wall and shot in the back, the police said.

The raiders were in the camp about 30 minutes before making good their escape. Police said they made off with an ungunned but armored half-track vehicle.

Thousands of cheering Jews welcomed the first large food convoy to get through to Jerusalem in 10 days.

Fifty trucks made the dangerous run through Arab road blocks to get food to Jerusalem's 100,000 Jews, whose rations are running dangerously low.

Although several single trucks have slipped into Jerusalem, this is the first full scale convoy to get through since the Arabs changed their sniping tactics to large scale attacks.

Taylor Gives Letter to Pope

Rome, April 6 (P)—President Truman has sent a personal letter to Pope Pius XII. It was learned officially today.

The letter was delivered to the pontiff yesterday by Myron C. Taylor, the president's special representative to the Holy See, it was learned. Contents of the letter were not disclosed.

Taylor, who arrived here Sunday by plane, declined to comment on a report published in Rome's leftist newspaper "Unita" that the president had given him "the duty to coordinate electoral activities of pro-American Italians and the Vatican."

Delivery of President Truman's letter just 12 days before Italy's momentous national election April 18, was viewed as highly significant in many informed quarters.

Taylor was received by the Pope in a 35-minute private audience last night.

The American, who conferred at length with Gen. Francisco Franco in Madrid last week, said he was not at liberty to reveal the nature of the discussions here or in Spain.
