Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lewis of Portland were in Salem, Monday enroute to California on a vacation trip.

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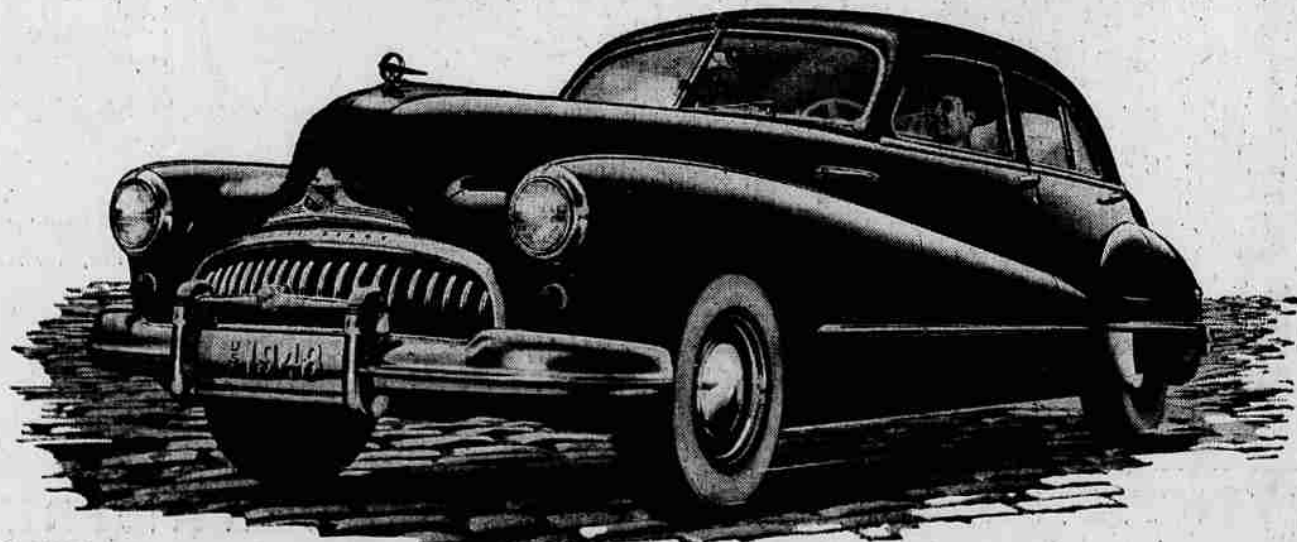
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
