

Road Bill Wins In Lower House

Oregon would receive \$7,000,000 annually for its road program under the postwar federal aid highway bill approved by the house of representatives on Monday, according to R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer. Under terms of the bill the state would match the federal allotment which would give Oregon a \$12,000,000 a year program for the next three years.

The bill was approved by a roll call vote of 278 to six, according to a dispatch from Washington.

The measure now goes to the senate, where approval is expected. The present program runs out on July 1.

Boy Scout Camp To Open July 4

The Cascade Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, will open summer camp season at Camp Pioneer, on Pine lake, 6 1/2 miles above Marion Forks at the foot of Mt. Jefferson, July 4. The camp will be conducted on a chartered troop basis, the Scout troops of the council registering and attending camp under their own individual camp leadership.

There are unlimited hiking facilities in the Mt. Jefferson primitive area; boating, canoeing, swimming and fishing in Pine Lake.

Troops can either take all of their meals in the camp dining lodge, or cook any number of their own meals in the open.

Instructors will be available for the waterfront activities—camp craft and nature studies.

The families of troop leaders can be housed on the camp site. Transportation to and from camp must be furnished by the individual units.
